Methodology

- ▶ Hybrid web/telephone survey of likely voters in the Milpitas Unified School District
- ▶ Interviewing conducted by trained, professional interviewers
- ▶ Interviews conducted in English, Spanish, Chinese, and Vietnamese.
- ▶ Interviews conducted from October 11th to October 19th
 - n=400: MoE \pm 4.9 percentage points
- ▶ Demographics weighted to be reflective of a likely June 2018 electorate or November 2018 electorate as noted
- ▶ Where applicable, results compared with previous surveys:

Key Findings

- ▶ A majority of voters have a positive opinion of the District and the quality of education in local schools.
- ▶ Anti-growth sentiment continues to be on the rise.
- ▶ A strong majority of voters are aware of the need for additional funding for school facilities.
- ▶ Initial support for a bond measure for local schools is above the 55% threshold needed for passage.
- ▶ Voters prioritize necessary repairs and upgrades as well as relieving overcrowding in schools.

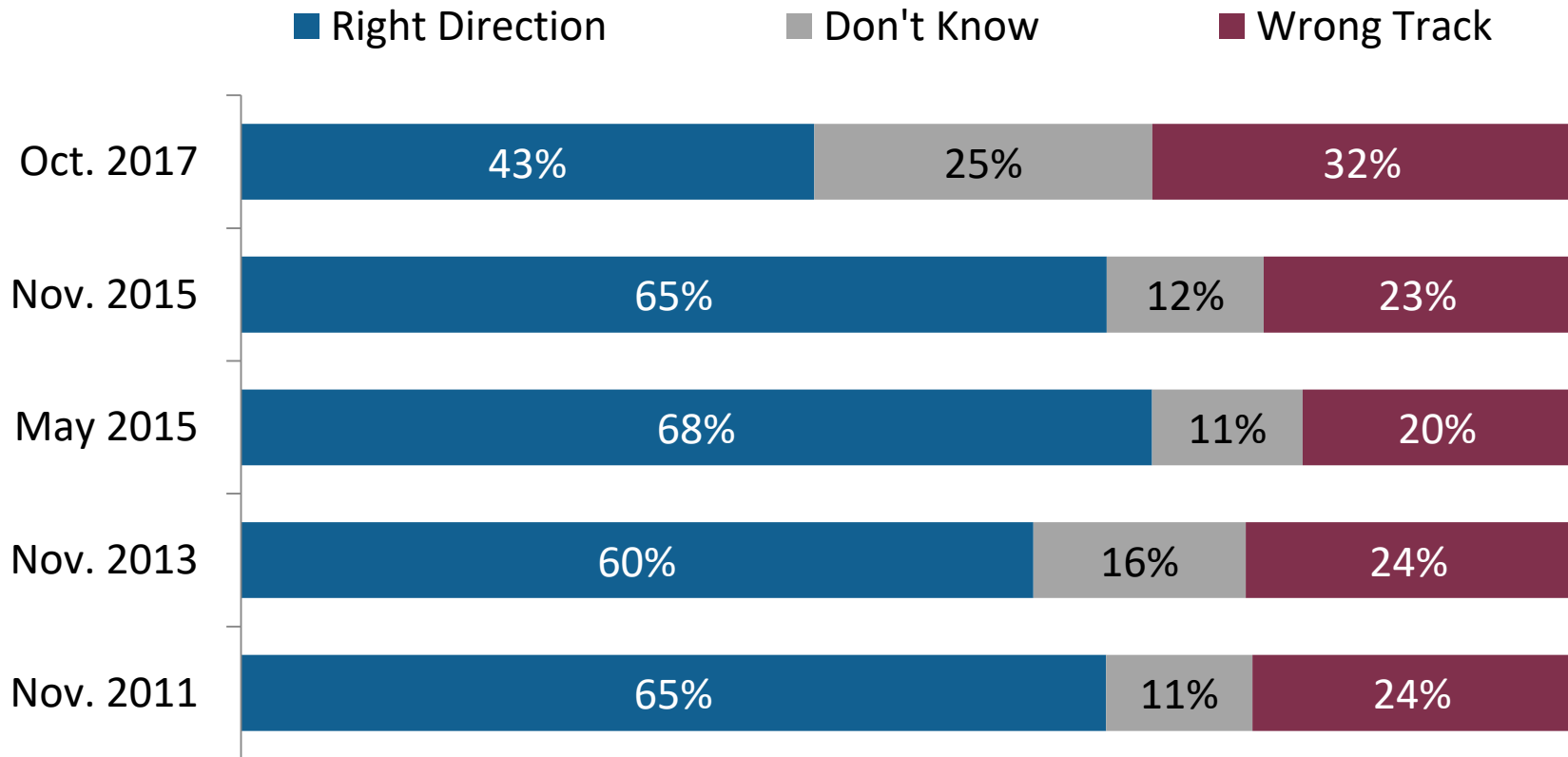


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Issue Environment

Right Direction/Wrong Track

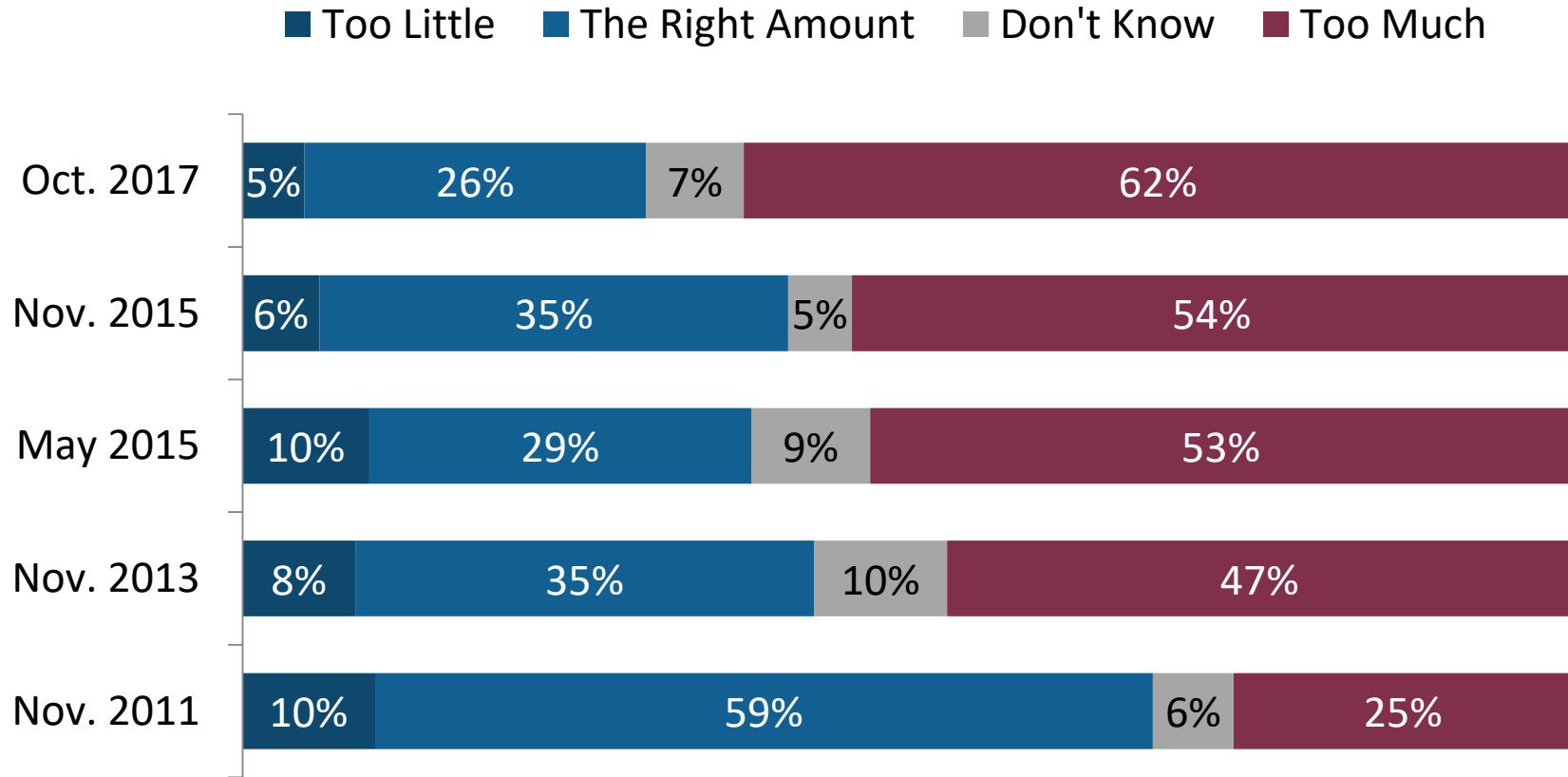
Voter optimism is weaker than in past polling; this may be partly related to the change in survey methodology.

Residential Growth & Development

Anti-growth sentiment is continuing to rise.

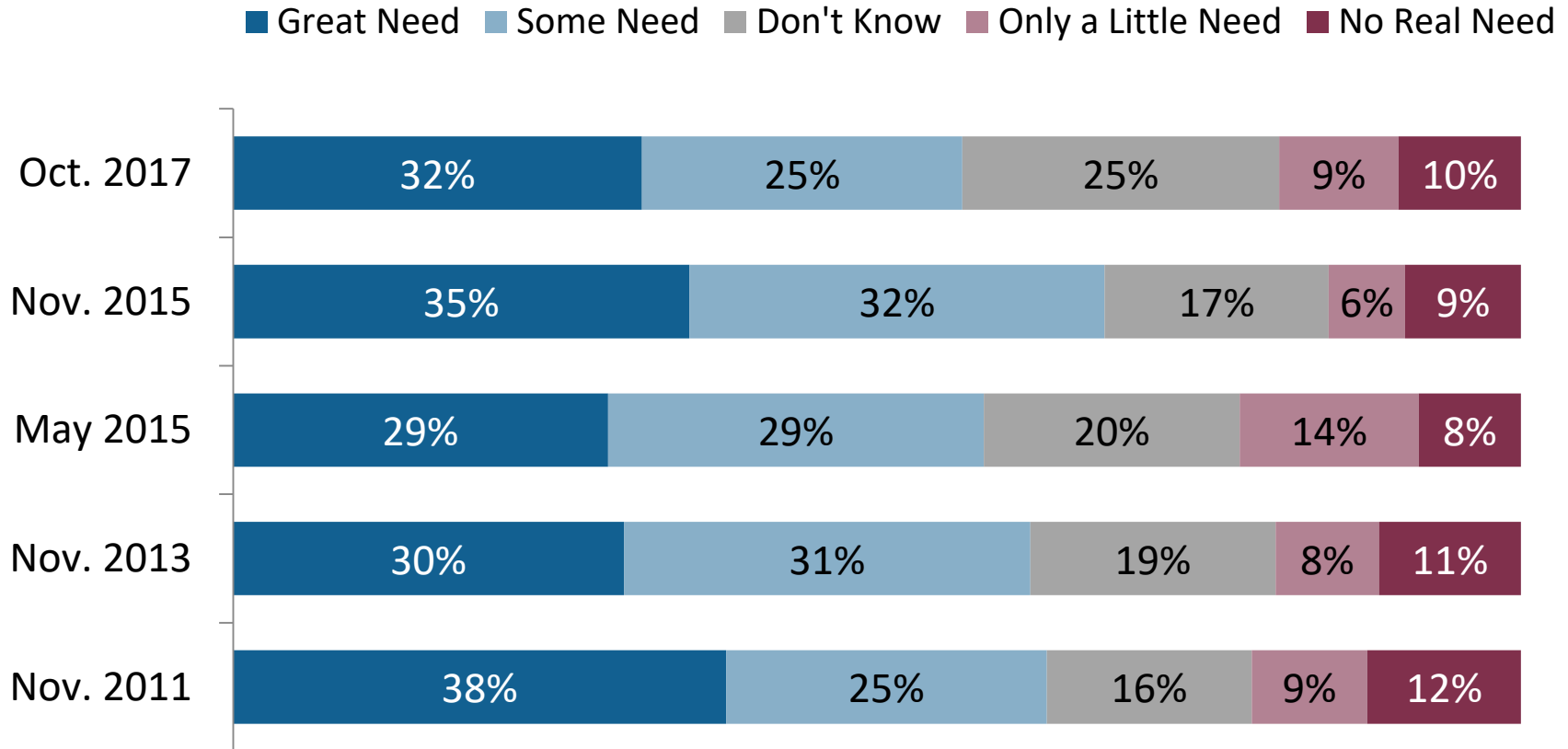

Over half are aware of the District's need for more money.

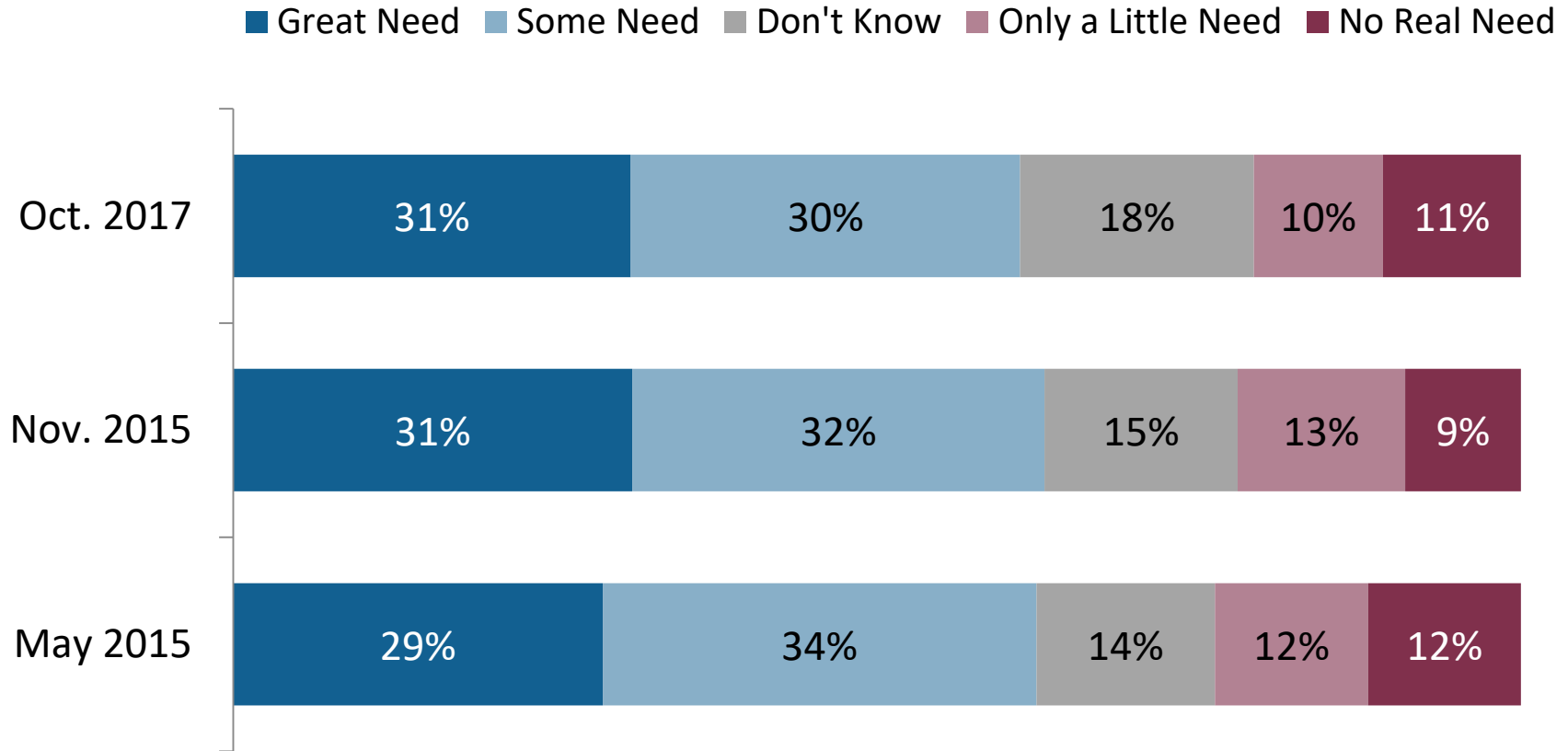

District Need for Money for Facilities

Roughly 6 in 10 voters are aware of the District's need for money for facilities.

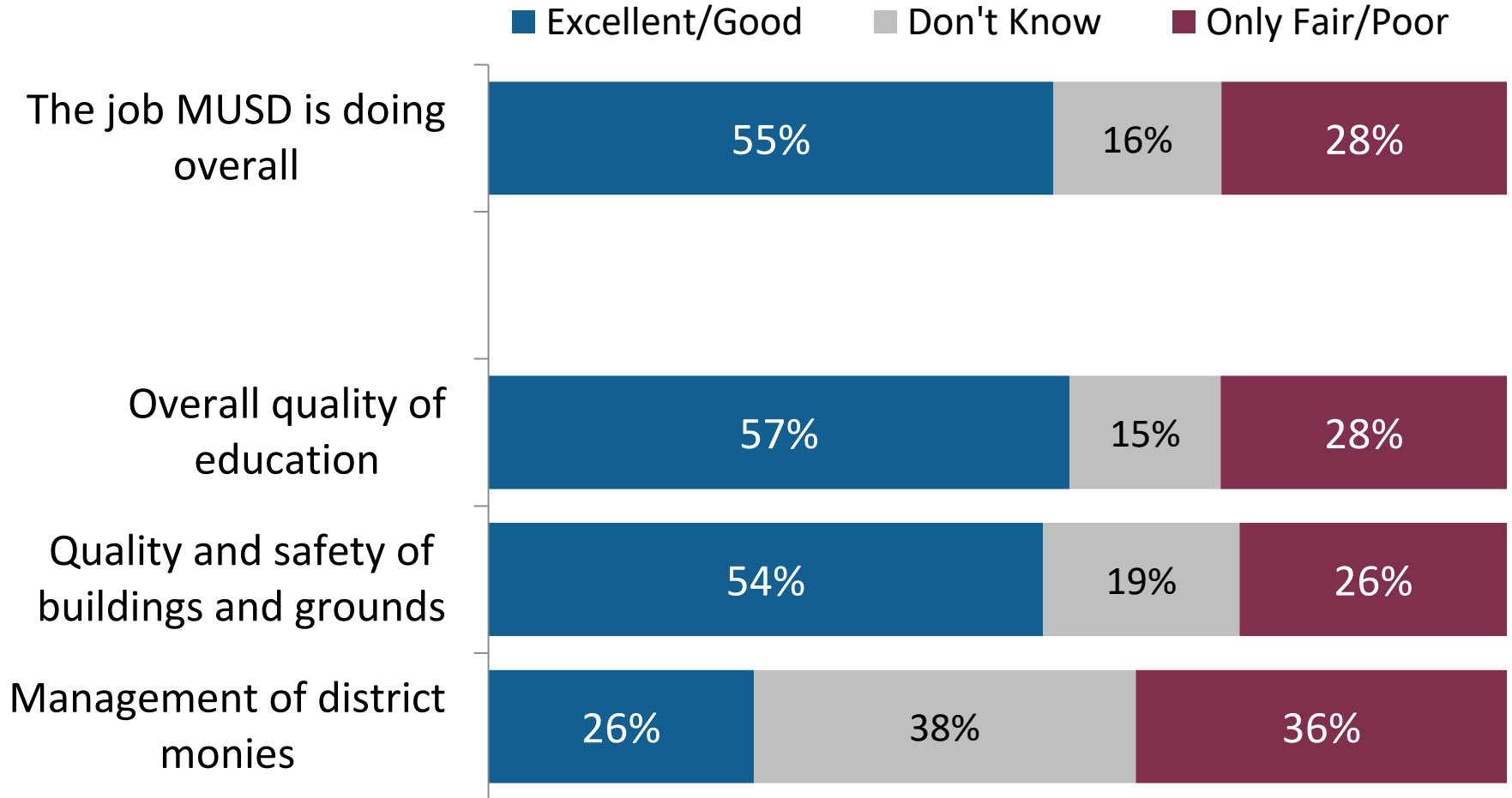

District Ratings

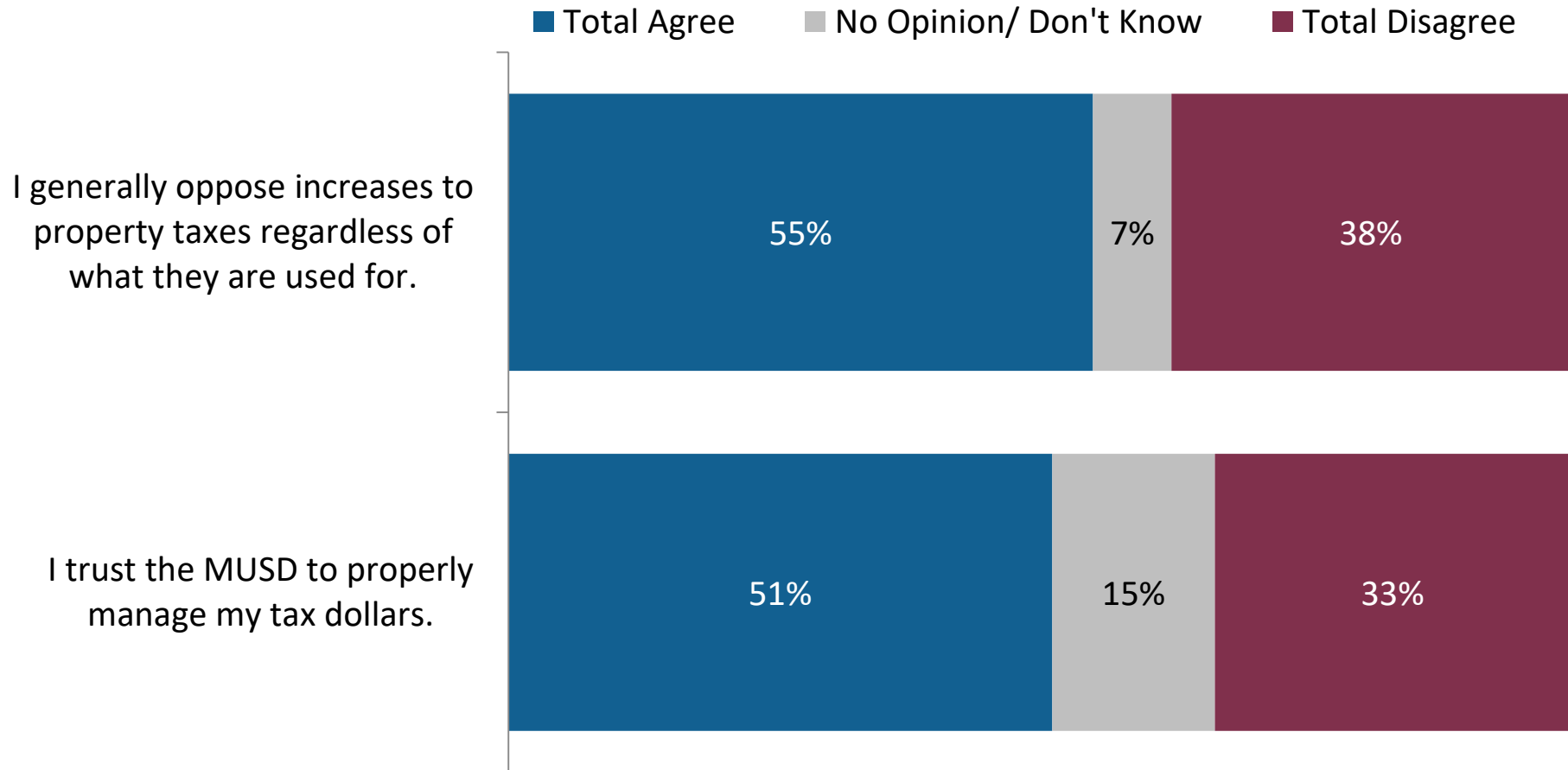
A majority give positive ratings of the overall quality of education.

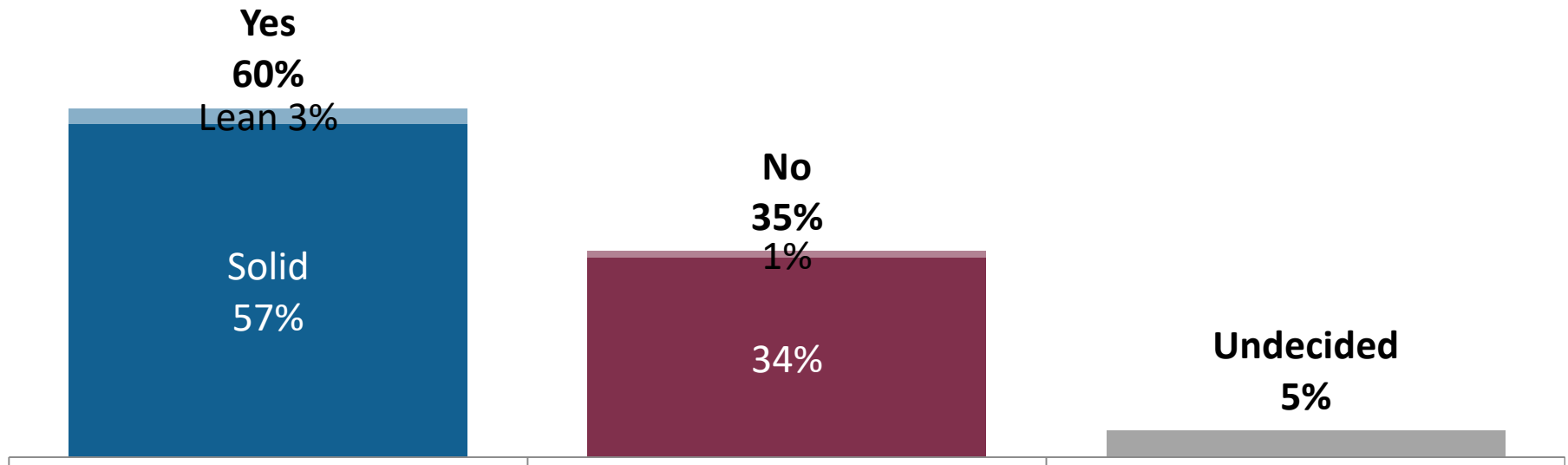
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Bond Measure

Initial Vote – June 2018 Model

On the initial vote, total support exceeds the necessary 55% threshold.

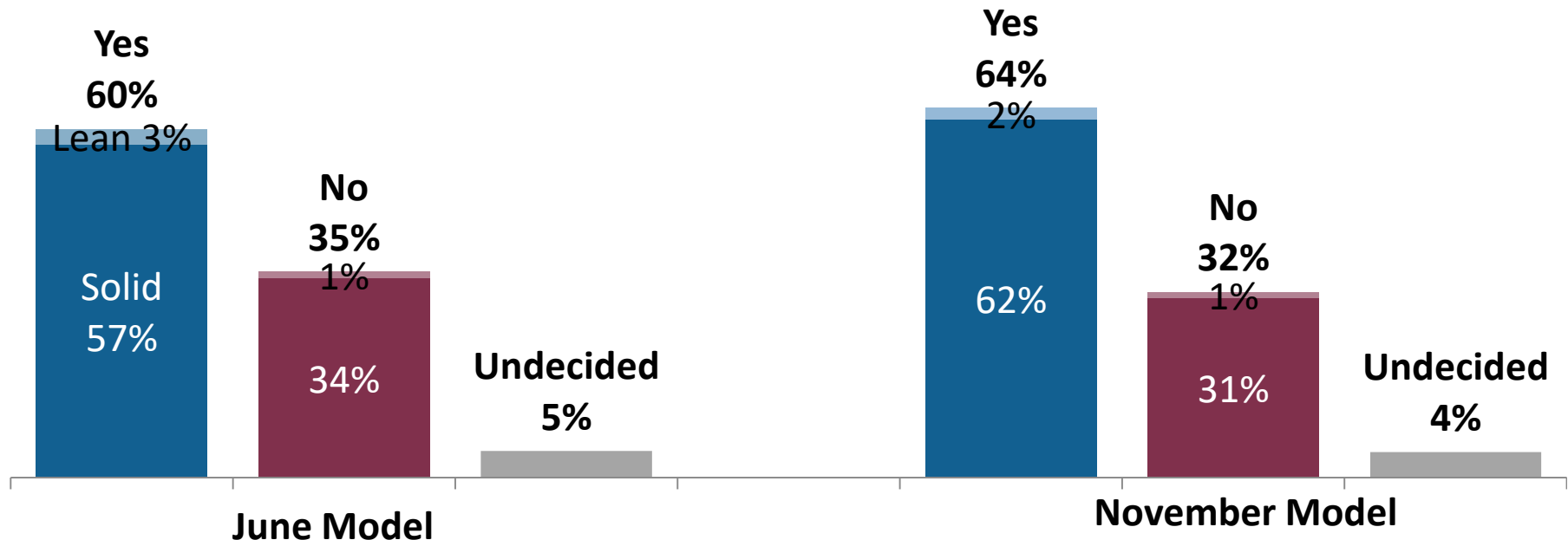
*To expand, upgrade and provide additional classrooms and science labs to accommodate higher student enrollment and relieve overcrowding in Milpitas elementary, middle and high schools; update infrastructure to support instructional technology; improve student safety and school security; maximize energy and water efficiency; and repair, construct, and acquire equipment for classrooms, sites and facilities, shall Milpitas Unified School District issue **\$284,000,000** in bonds at legal rates, with citizen oversight, annual audits, no funds for administrators' salaries and all funds benefiting local schools?*



Initial Vote – June vs. November

Support for a bond measure is higher among a November '18 electorate than among a June '18 electorate.

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Q12. If the election were held today, would you vote Yes to approve or No to reject this measure?

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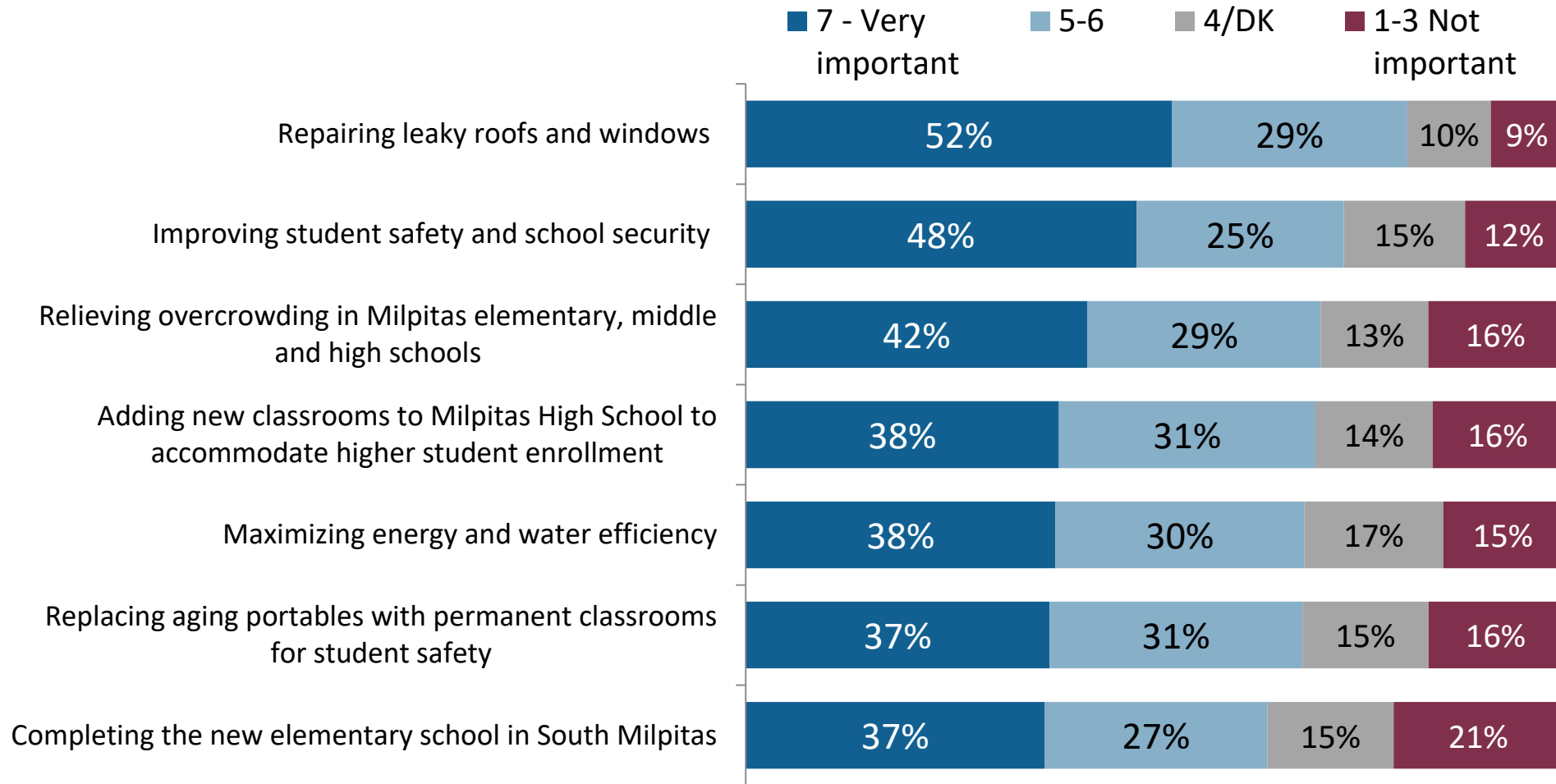


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Additional Information

Measure Elements

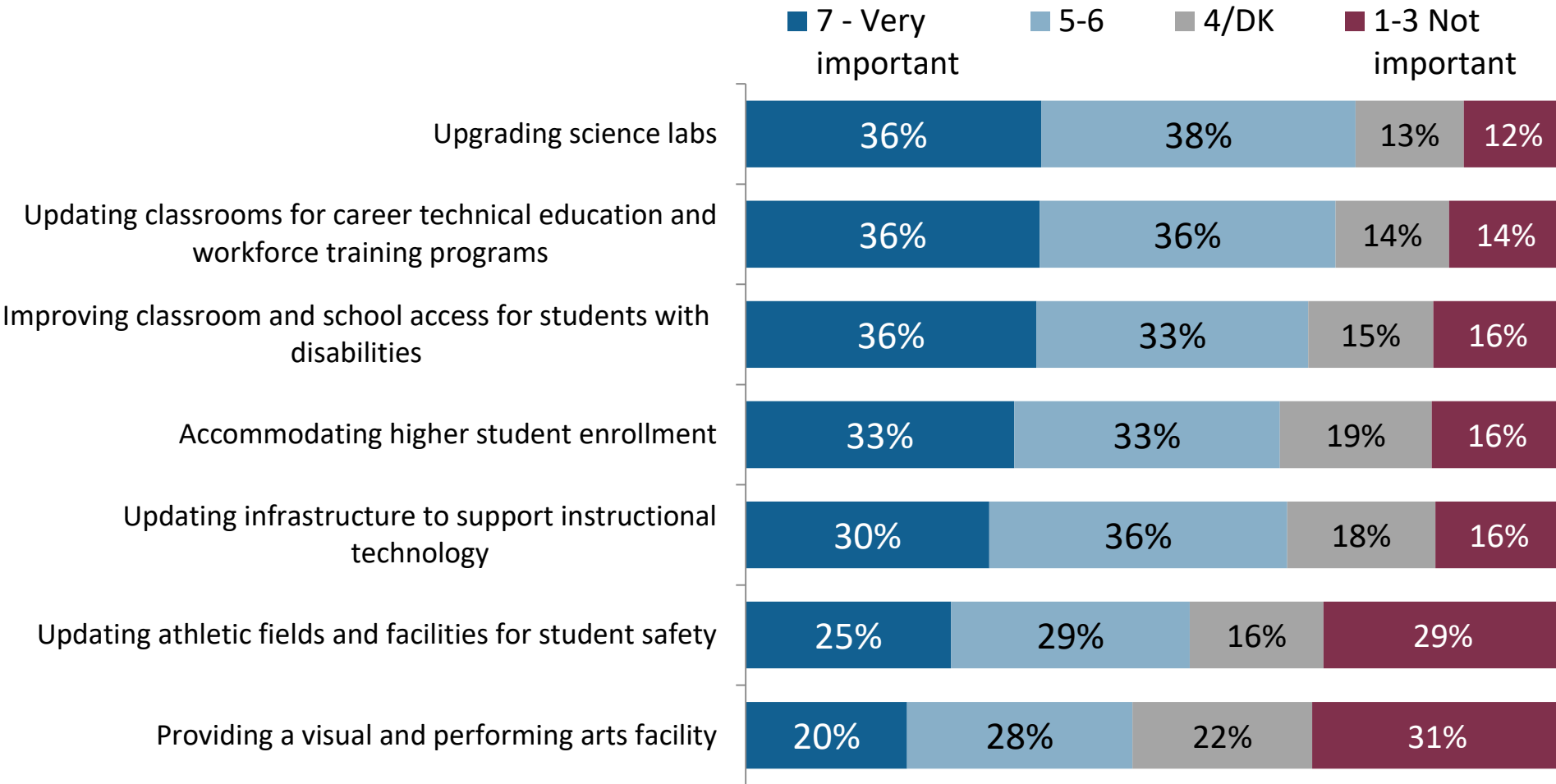
Basic repairs, student safety and security, and relieving overcrowding are important priorities to voters.

Measure Elements, Continued

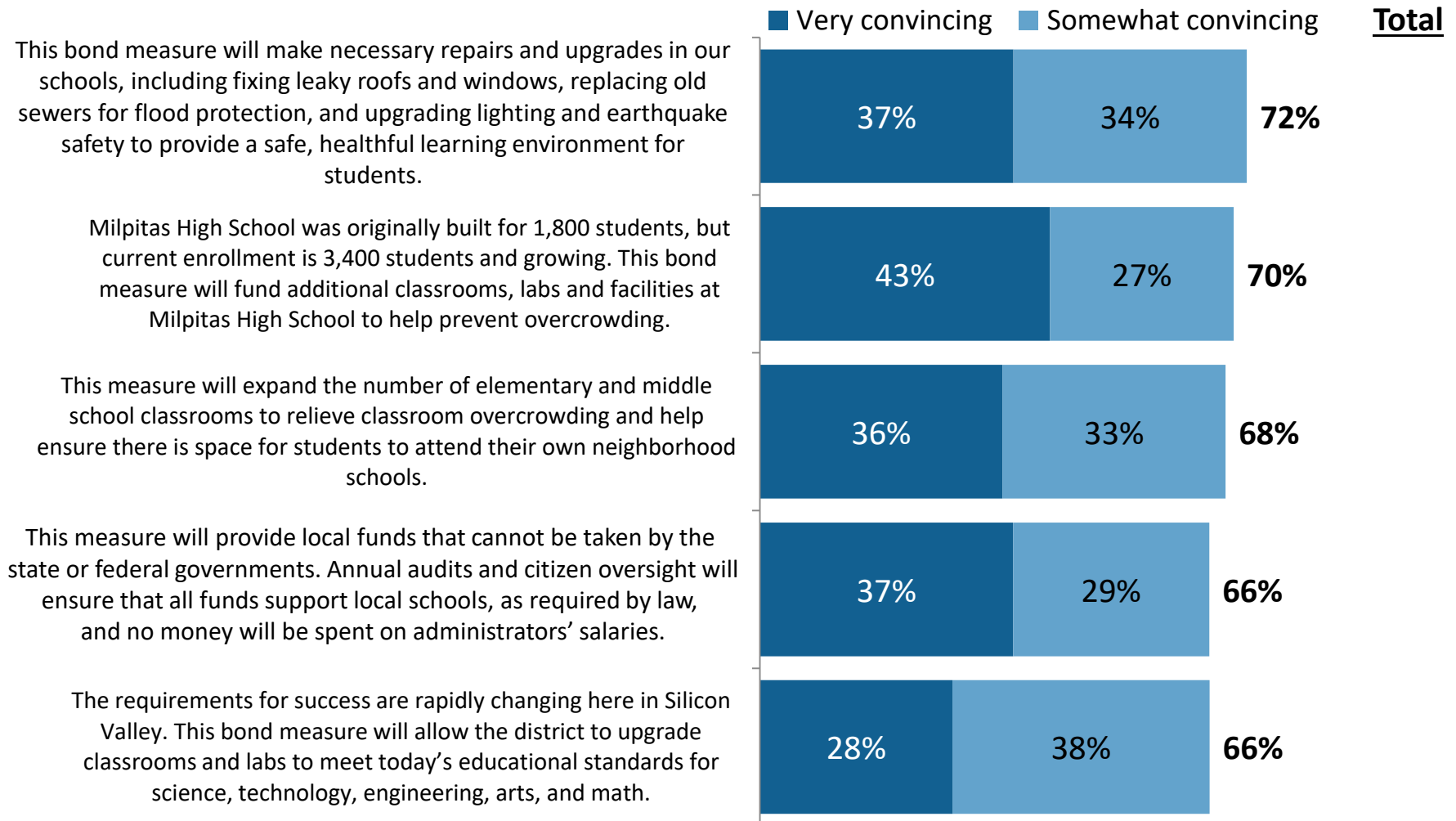
Most measure elements are viewed as important, though some with less intensity.

Additional Information

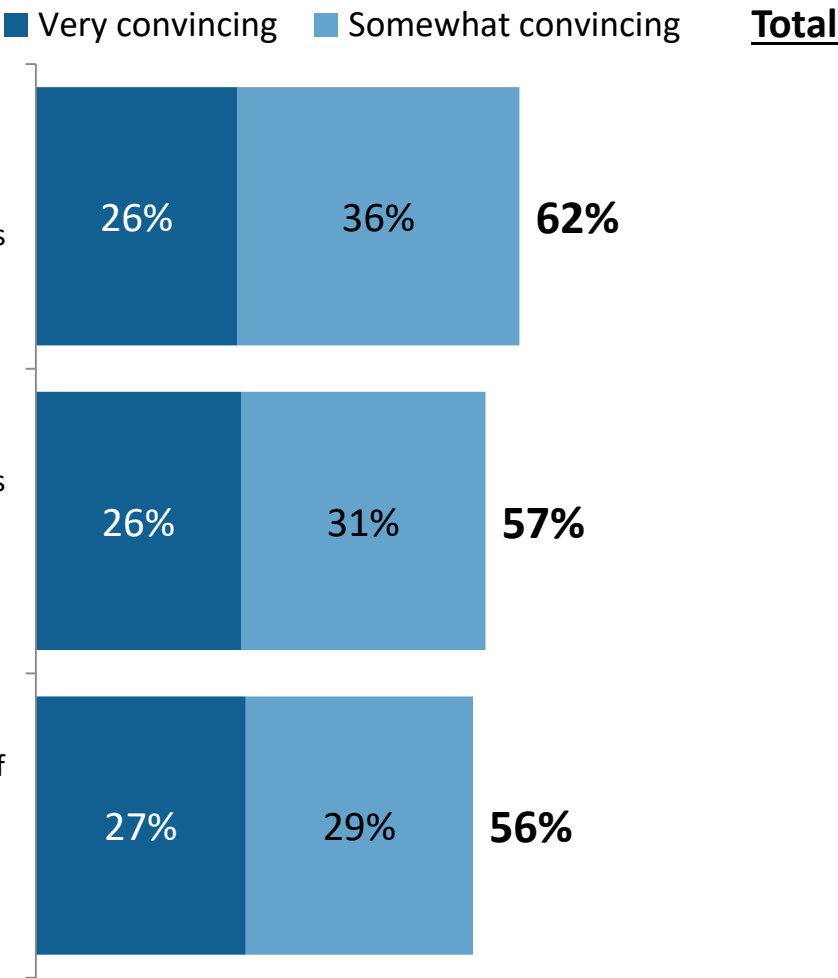
Information about necessary repairs/upgrades and overcrowding is compelling as a reason to support a bond measure.

Other information is also convincing to a majority of voters.



The District has already made some necessary repairs and improvements to local schools. This measure will complete the next phase of improvements needed to bring our classrooms up to today's standards.

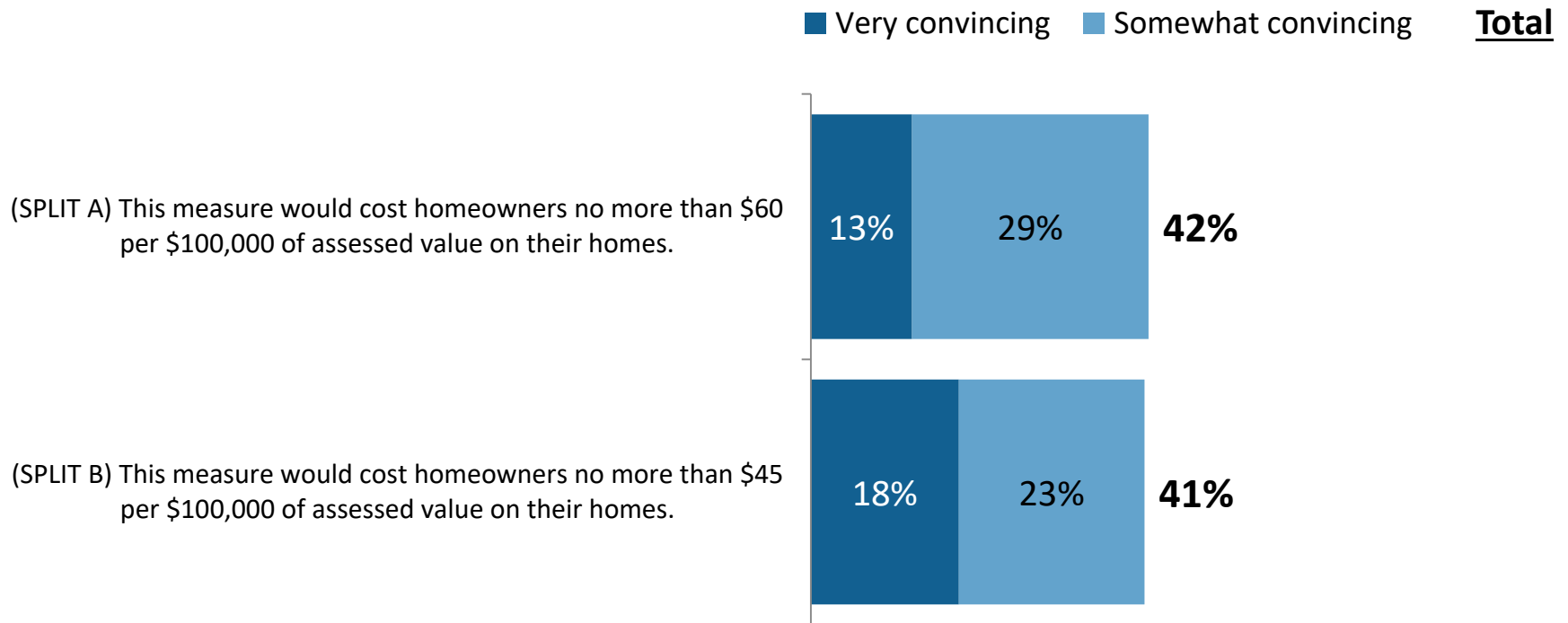
Good, welcoming schools make our neighborhood desirable. This bond measure will help keep our property values strong by improving and upgrading local schools.

With this measure, the District will make creative and efficient use of existing facilities to relieve classroom overcrowding rather than spending hundreds of millions of dollars on building a new high school.

Measure Cost Information

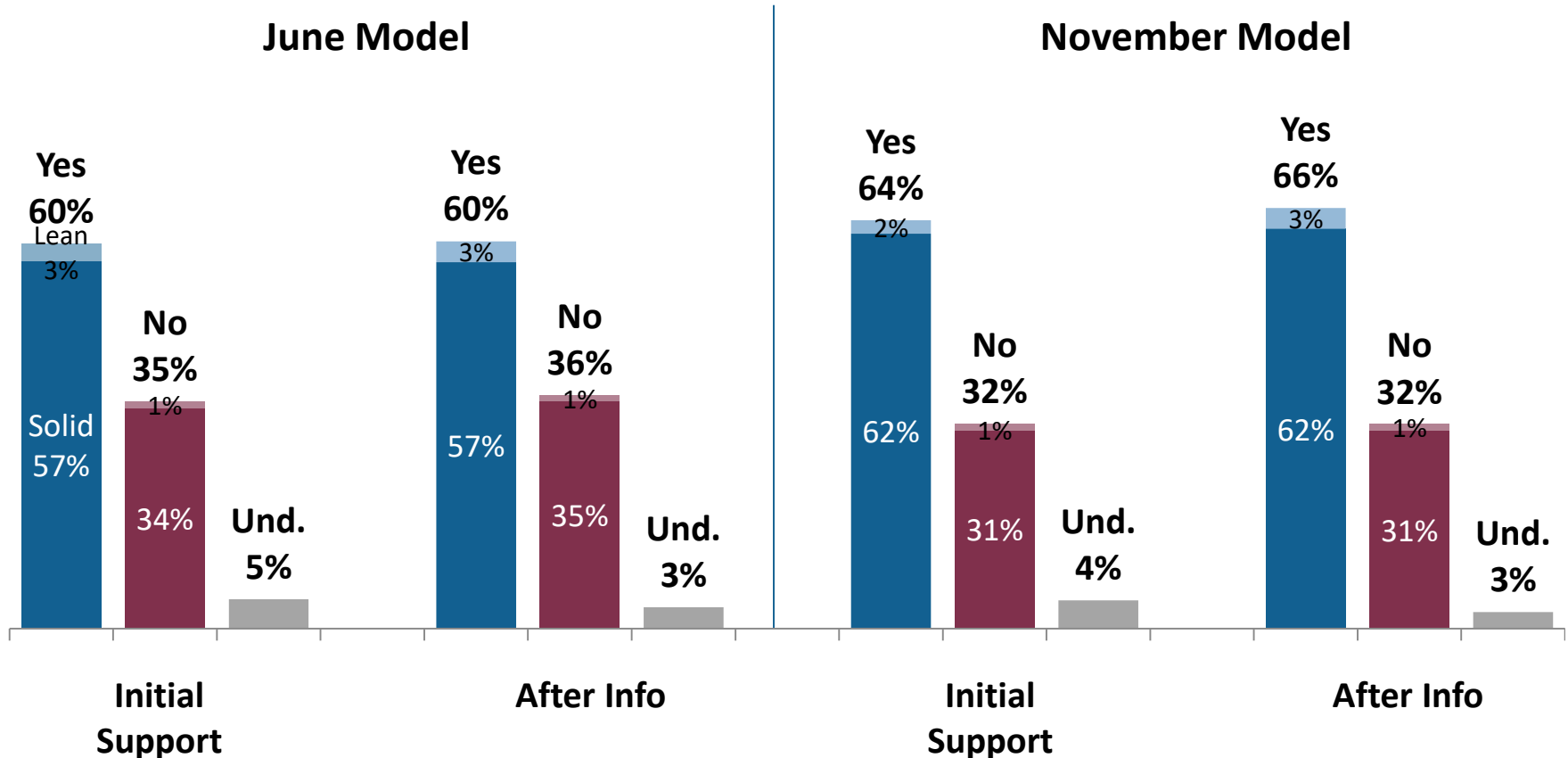
Hearing the cost to homeowners is a convincing reason to support the measure for under half. There is little difference between those who heard the different costs.

Hearing more information does not significantly change overall support.



Summary of Messages

Many find additional positive and negative information about a potential measure convincing.

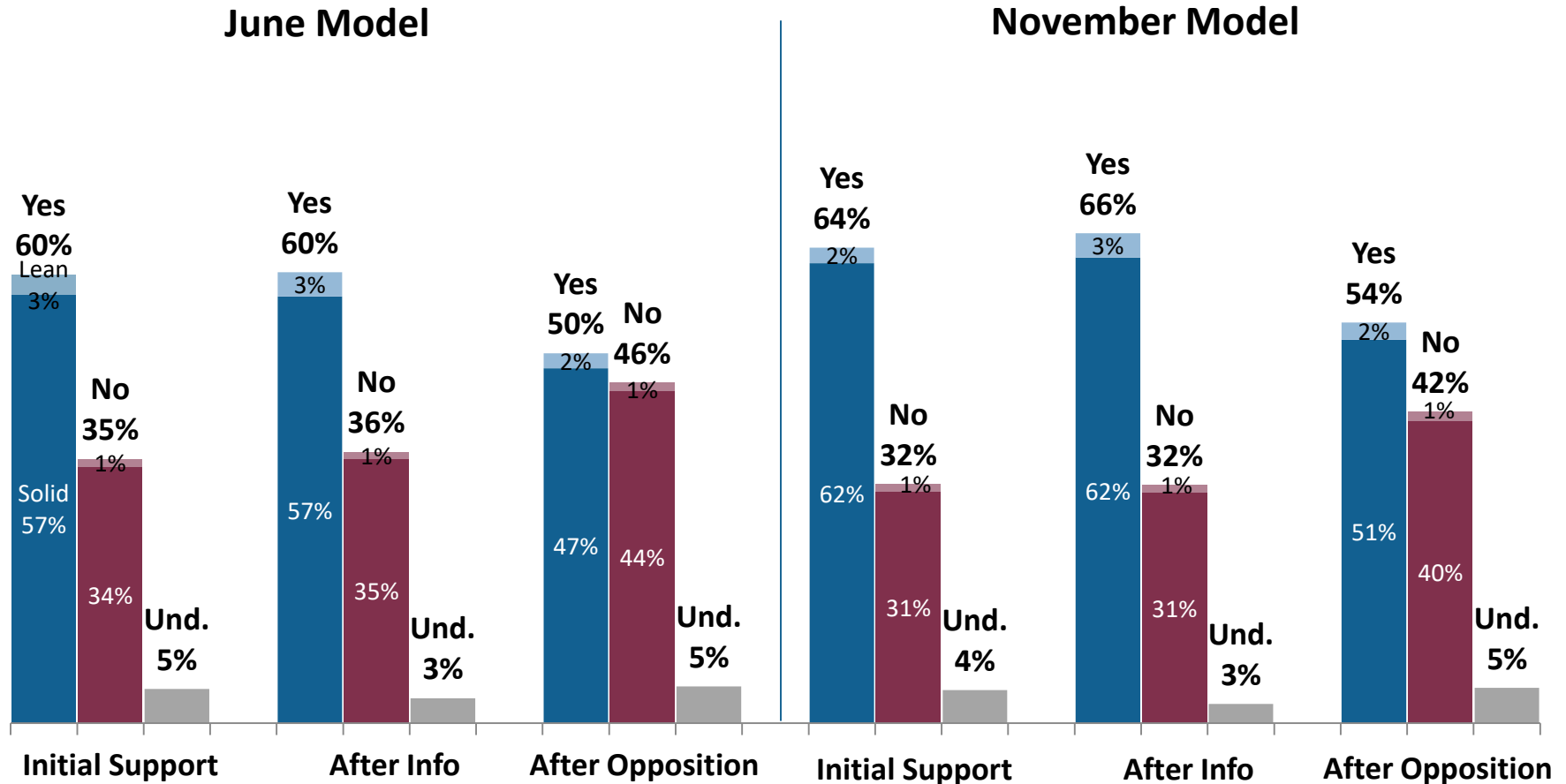
Positive Information	% Convincing
Necessary Repairs: This bond measure will make necessary repairs and upgrades in our schools to provide a safe, healthful learning environment for students.	72%
High School Overcrowding: Milpitas High School was originally built for 1,800 students. This bond measure will help prevent overcrowding.	70%
Neighborhood Schools: This measure will expand the number of elementary and middle school classrooms to help ensure students can attend their own neighborhood schools.	68%

Potential Opponents' Messages	% Convincing
2012 Repeat: Repeat of a bond measure that passed in 2012. We shouldn't give the District more money to pay for the same projects that they should have already completed.	69%
Too Many Taxes: There are too many taxes in our area. Homeowners are already paying a parcel tax and a bond for the District.	68%
Money Management: We can't trust the school district to manage money properly. They need to do a better job managing the money they have instead of asking taxpayers for even more.	64%

Vote Progression Through Survey

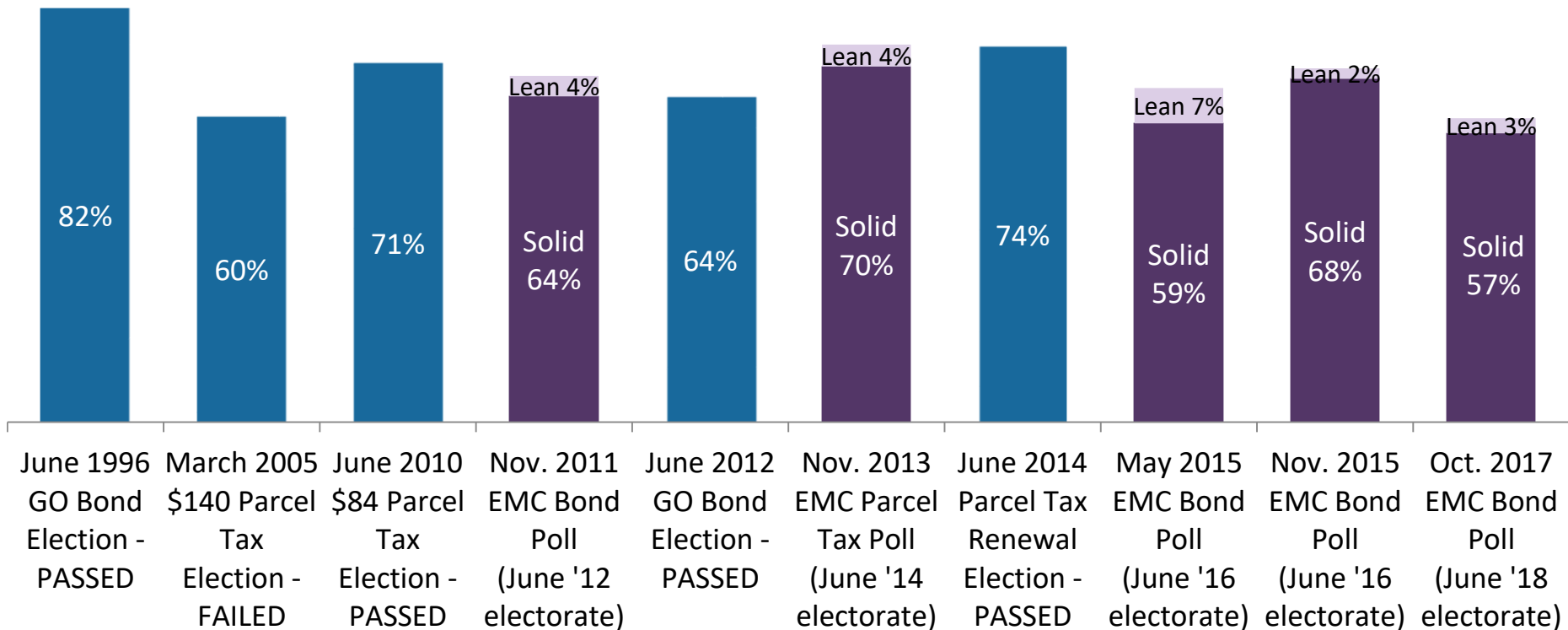
Potential opposition messages are effective. Support falls well below 55% among likely June '18 voters.

Overview of Recent Polling and Election Results

An overview of recent polling and elections in the district shows that election results track with poll results and that the community has been generally supportive of local school measures.

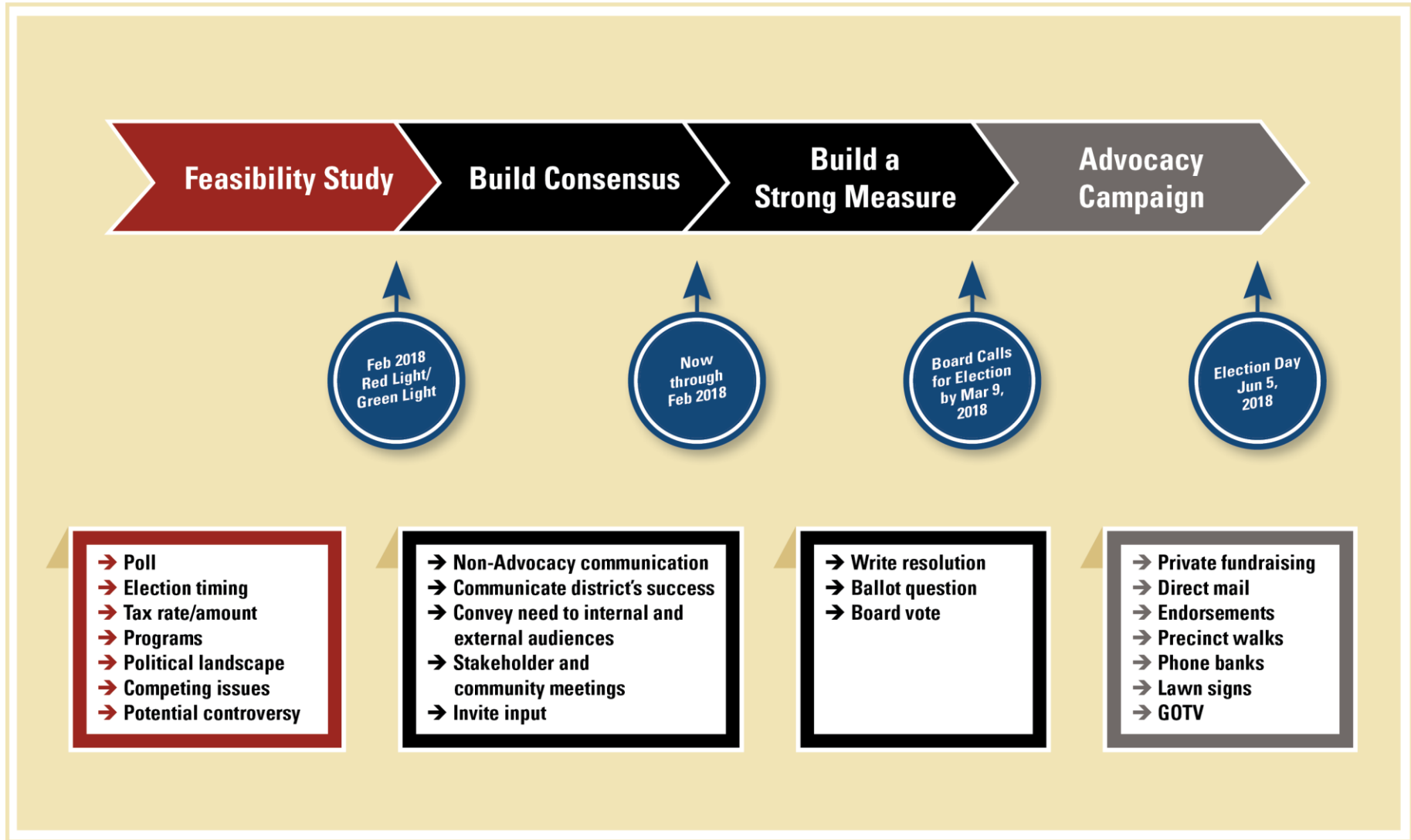


Election results are in blue and poll results are in purple.

Conclusions and Recommendations

- ▶ Although local voters are divided about how things are going in the community and many appear to be unhappy with local growth and development, a majority rate the Milpitas Unified School District positively and support an investment in the schools.
- ▶ A bond measure appears feasible for the 2018 ballot. However, an opposition campaign could be impactful.
- ▶ A June election would be difficult and may not be viable.
- ▶ A privately funded outreach effort would be essential to help voters understand the bond would provide for necessary repairs and upgrades in local schools and ease overcrowding in the high school, middle and elementary schools.

Timeline



Feasibility

- Poll results indicate that November 2018 voters are more supportive of a measure than June 2018 voters
- A successful June election would require an aggressive independent campaign that could change who votes in the election
- A measure is more likely to be successful in November
- Political landscape in November is different than June

Next Steps

- Continue outreach to community to provide information about needs and potential plan
- Seek feedback and incorporate input into final plan
- Communicate with:
 - Internal Stakeholders: Teachers, staff and parents
 - Community leaders: Elected officials, community groups and leaders
 - Voters

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
