High School Graduation Requirements

BP 6146.1

Instruction

The Governing Board desires to prepare all students to obtain a high school diploma to enable them to take advantage of opportunities for postsecondary education and employment.

Course Requirements

To obtain a high school diploma, students shall complete ~~at least~~ 220 credits in the following courses in grades 9-12, with each course being one year unless otherwise specified:

a. Three courses in social studies, including United States history and geography; world history, culture, and geography; a one-semester course in American government and civics (meets the UC/CSU “a” requirement; and a one-semester course in economics (meets the UC/CSU “g” requirement) (Education Code 51225.3)

~~1.b.~~ Four courses in English (meets the UC/CSU “b” requirement) (Education Code 51225.3)

At least one mathematics course, ~~or a combination of the two mathematics courses,~~ shall meet or exceed state academic content standards for Algebra I or Integrated Mathematics I. (Meets the UC/CSU “c” requirement) Completion of such coursework prior to grade 9 shall satisfy the Algebra I or Integrated Mathematics I requirement, but shall not exempt a student from the requirement to complete ~~two-three~~ mathematics courses in grades 9-12. (Education Code 51224.5)

~~Students may be awarded up to one mathematics course credit for successful completion of an approved computer science course that is classified as a "category c" course based on the "a-g" course requirements for college admission. (Education Code 51225.3, 51225.35)~~

~~3.d. Two courses in science, including biological and physical sciences (meets the UC/CSU "d" requirement) (Education Code 51225.3)~~

~~6. e. Two courses in a Language Other Than English. The first-year of Language Other Than English may be met prior to high school; however, credits will not count towards the 220-credit requirement. (meets the UC/CSU "e" requirement) A student whose primary language is designated other than English is exempt from the core graduation requirement of two years of a Language Other than English course, as long as their formal instruction in the Language Other Than English took place after the 6th grade. A student may receive a waiver from the two-year Language Other Than English requirement due to a specific learning disability, if it is clearly stated in his/her IEP or state standardized test results show a need for intensive academic intervention. (Please see AR 6146.1 High School Graduation Requirements - World Language.)~~

~~6. World Language course. The first year of World Language may be met prior to high school; however, credits will not count towards the 220 credit requirement. A student whose primary language is designated other than English is exempt from the core graduation requirement of one World Language course. A student may receive a waiver from the one year World Language requirement due to a specific learning disability, if it is clearly stated in his/her IEP or state standardized test results show a need for intensive academic intervention. g. Electives. At least one course from an approved “g” elective. One year of Career and Technical Education is recommended. ~~Because the prescribed course of study may not accommodate the needs of some students, the Board shall provide alternative means for the completion of prescribed courses in accordance with law.~~

If an administrator so recommends, an alternate 180 credit course of study is available for students at Ridgway Continuation High School—, or the Individualized Education Program Team can determine that an alternate course of study may be available.~~This alternate option is also available to—~~ For students who were enrolled at the alternative high schools known as Small Necessary Schools. Notwithstanding the foregoing, this alternate 180 course of study for students who attended Small Necessary Schools expires at the end of the 2018-2019 school year. This option exists to permit these students to graduate within a four year time frame and with the same assurances they received when they enrolled in the Small Necessary Schools before such schools were eliminated and replaced with programs at each school site which support graduation. In addition to satisfying the CAHSEE requirement, these students complete the following course of study for a high school diploma.

Exemptions and Waivers

A foster youth, homeless student, or former juvenile court school student who transfers into the district any time after completing his/her second year of high school shall be required to complete all graduation requirements specified in Education Code 51225.3 but shall be exempt from any additional district-adopted graduation requirements, unless the Superintendent or designee makes a finding that the student is reasonably able to complete the requirements in time to graduate by the end of his/her fourth year of high school. Within 30 days of the transfer, any such student shall be notified of the availability of the exemption and whether he/she qualifies for it. (Education Code 51225.1)

In addition, the Superintendent or designee shall facilitate the on-time graduation of children of military families by waiving specific course requirements for graduation if the student has satisfactorily completed similar coursework in another district. (Education Code 49701)

Retroactive Diplomas

Until July 31, 2018, any student who completed grade 12 in the 2003-04 school year or a subsequent school year and has met all applicable graduation requirements other than the passage of the high school exit examination shall be granted a high school diploma. (Education Code 60851.6)

The district may retroactively grant a high school diploma to a former student who was interned by order of the federal government during World War II or who is an honorably discharged veteran of World War II, the Korean War, or the Vietnam War, provided that he/she was enrolled in a district school immediately preceding the internment or military service and he/she did not receive a diploma because his/her education was interrupted due to the internment or military service. A deceased former student who satisfies these conditions may be granted a retroactive diploma to be received by his/her next of kin. (Education Code 51430)

In addition, the district may grant a diploma to a veteran who entered the military service of the United States while he/she was a district student in grade 12 and who had completed the first half of the work required for grade 12. (Education Code 51440)
