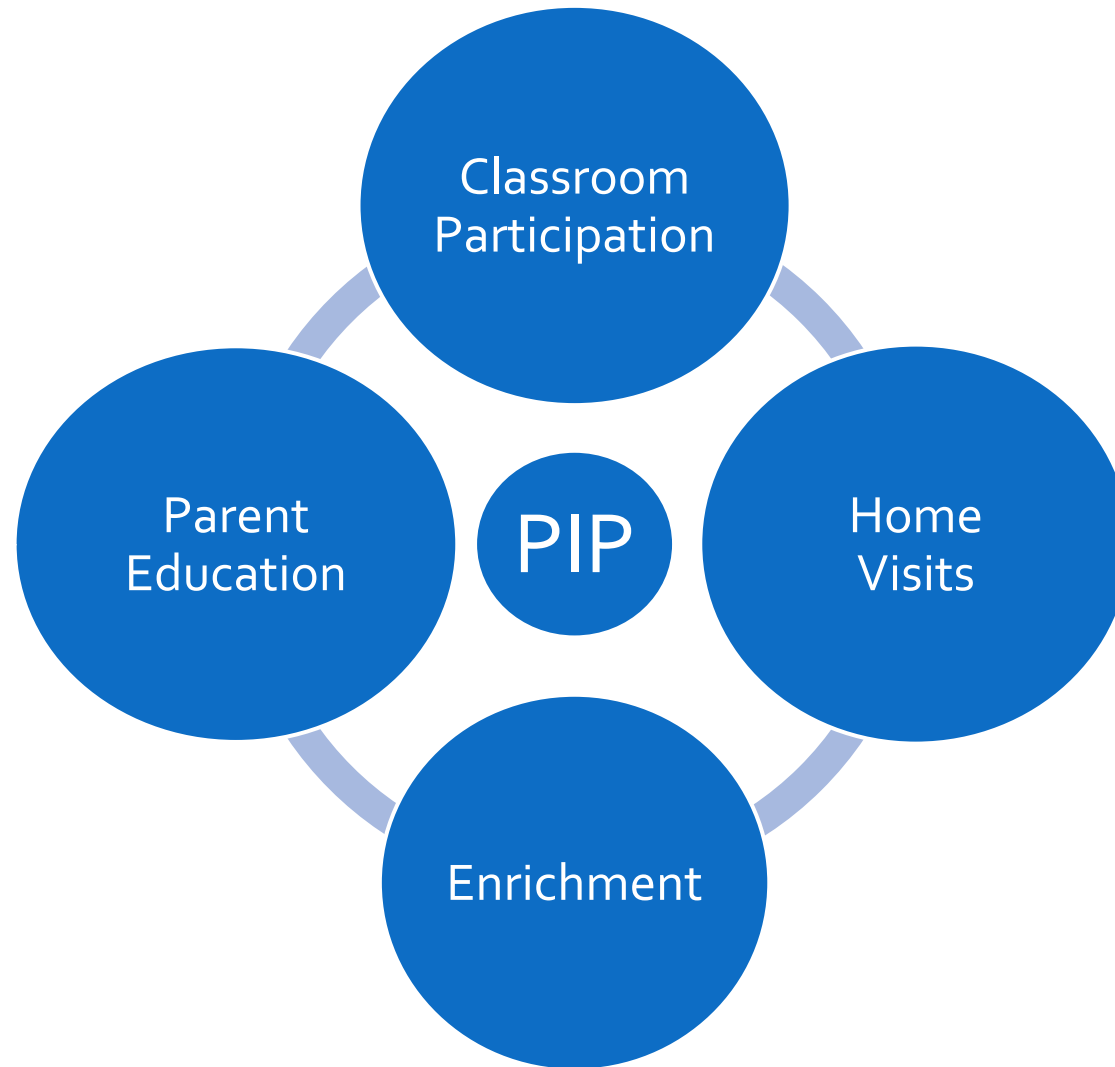
The *Parent Involvement Project* (PIP) is a unique and highly successful program that addresses the achievement gap by uniting parents, schools and the community.

PIP History

- In 1976, the San Mateo City School District established a child-parent early learning program as an alternative approach in meeting the needs of children living in high need areas of the community. Its design as an early intervention program for four year olds was influenced by research throughout the country that was demonstrating that potential low achievers were more apt to be successful academically if they had an enriched pre-school experience. Furthermore, this success was in direct proportion to the amount of parent involvement that existed in the program.
- 1990 Budgetary cutbacks arose and in order to preserve the program the Friends of the Early Learning Centers (ELC) was formed. Jerry Hill, Carol Groom, and Sue Lampert among others.
- 1992 State preschool funds, some district funding and private funding were combined enabling expansion from one initial program to 5 preschool classes
- 2003 Through a generous donation from a Donor Advised Fund of the Peninsula Community Foundation, the ELC essential parent involvement components were extended into kindergarten at Fiesta Gardens, George Hall, LEAD, and College Park (former Turnbull) elementary schools and changed the name from ELC to Learning Centers (LC).

- Model ELC program when private donor expanded to other School Districts
- 2005 Expanded to 1st Grade at Fiesta Gardens, George Hall, LEAD, and College Park (former Turnbull) elementary schools
- 2011 Change names from Learning Centers to Parent Involvement Project (PIP)
- May 2014 PIP program received the Kent Award
- June 2015 Funding for College Park concluded
- August 2015 Expanded to TK at LEAD and George Hall
- June 2018 Funding for 1st grade PIP program concluded
- June 2020 Funding for TK/K PIP program concluded
- July 2020 Transition from Silicon Valley Community Foundation (former Peninsula Community Foundation) to West Ed
- June 2021 Funding for preschool PIP program concluded
