## State and Local Context

## Criteria for Opening Campuses

Among our earliest criteria for opening campuses on August 17 were a decrease in hospitalizations over 14 days, whereas currently we are seeing a 14 day rise.

Efficient testing and contact tracing are additional criteria, and while testing is becoming more widely available, delays in appointments and results pose a significant concern.

### Indicator 1: Cases and hospitalizations

The first indicator tracks whether the total number of confirmed COVID-19 cases and hospitalized patients with confirmed COVID-19 cases is flat or decreasing.



### **Indicator 2: Sufficient Hospital Capacity**

Goal met



This indicator measures whether we have sufficient hospital capacity to meet the needs of our residents.

For this indicator, we look at total capacity across Alameda County. Depending on their health care provider, many Berkeley residents would go to hospitals outside of Berkeley if they were hospitalized.

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### **Indicator 3: Testing**

This indicator measures whether the number of COVID-19 tests being conducted each day is sufficient to ensure that disease activity is being detected and transmission to other people halted.



Average daily tests June 25 - July 8, 2020



#### Indicator 4: Disease containment



To break chains of transmission, we must rapidly develop the capacity necessary to identify and isolate persons with COVID-19 and those who have been exposed to COVID-19. Although contact tracing has long been a core part of the work of Public Health, we must now do this at unprecedented scale and speed.


### Lab Results Update


Due to increasing demand for COVID-19 testing, lab results may take up to 4 to 6 days. We apologize for the delay and will notify you as soon as your results are ready.


### Significant Wait Times for Appointments and for Results

Results may take 4-6 days








## City of Berkeley reopening roadmap

- Hand-washing stations

### **Health Practices**

- Ongoing consultation with local health officials, including:
  - Physical Distancing, Face Coverings, Student Cohorts
  - Hygiene Practices
  - Lunch programs
  - Bus transportation
  - Screening, contact tracing, and quarantining procedures
- University research institutions as potential partners for ramping up testing

### Recommendation to the Board of Education

### Begin our School Year in Distance Learning

Elementary and middle schools will stay in distance learning for the first eight weeks of instruction, until October 9th. By September 15, we should be able to reassess and announce our capacity and timeline for the next steps to transition to on-campus teaching - if it is possible to do so in compliance with health guidance.

High school students will also stay in distance learning, most likely until the December break, supplemented by afterschool activities as described below. We will assess the feasibility of transitioning to campus learning sooner, at the quarter break, but recognize that the logistical issues for high school may compel us to wait until the semester break.

### Recommendation to the Board of Education

### Begin our School Year in Distance Learning

Phased, prioritized reopening of key programs as soon as we can implement required risk reduction practices

- Early Childhood Education (preschool) programs at Franklin, Hopkins, and King CDC
- Services for students with IEPs (for services that can't be provided online)
- Elementary after-school programs
- Middle and high school after-school activities, including some sports practices, physical conditioning, clubs, science labs, advisories, and more
- Elementary "Ed Camps" (a potential new school-day program that we are developing to support essential workers)
- Student support and intervention programs

### Action Item

### Begin our School Year in Distance Learning

- 1. Elementary and middle schools will stay in distance learning for the first eight weeks of instruction, until October 9th.
- 2. High school students will also stay in distance learning, most likely until the December break. The Board of Education will assess the feasibility of transitioning to campus learning sooner, at the quarter break.
- 3. BUSD will begin a phased, prioritized reopening of key programs as soon as the district can implement required risk reduction practices, and contingent on the amendment of current Shelter-in-Place orders and health conditions
