

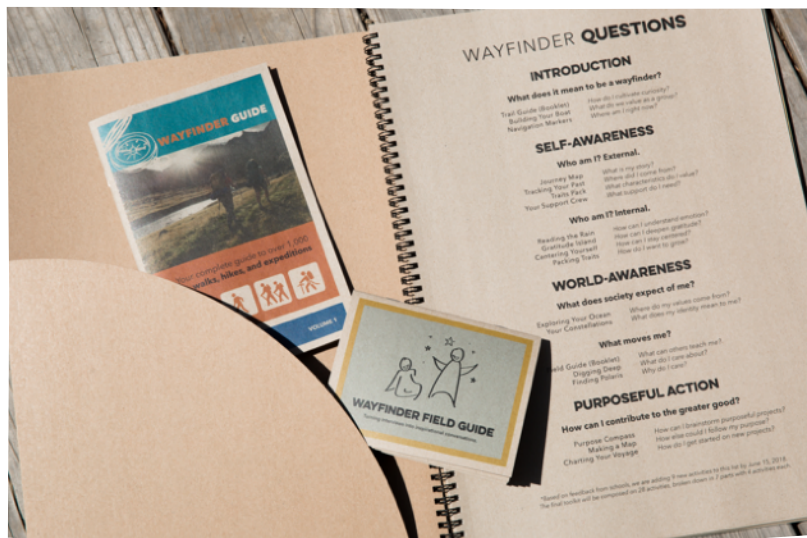
PROJECT WAYFINDER

Project Wayfinder is a social movement and practical philosophy for young people to create lives of meaning and purpose.

Founded at Stanford University's d.school and now operating as an independent organization, Project Wayfinder has designed a yearlong purpose learning curriculum to equip students with the skills, knowledge and confidence to become purposeful navigators.



Our toolkit is inspired by cutting-edge purpose research, wisdom and practices from native wayfinding traditions and our own personal experiences.
