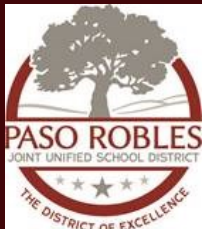

School Profile

PRISC homeschool is located in the central region of Paso Robles and serves students in grades pre-kinder through eight following a traditional calendar. At the beginning of the 2020-21 school year, 181 students were enrolled, including 14.3% in special education, 7.1% qualifying for English Language Learner support, and 34.12% qualifying for free or reduced price lunch.

About the SARC

Quality, Currency, Availability of Textbooks and Instructional Materials (School Year 2020-21)

All textbooks used in the core curriculum at Independence High School are aligned to the California Common Core State Standards. Standards-based instructional materials are approved by the district's Board of Trustees. The district follows the State Board of Education's six-year adoption cycle for core content materials and the eight-year cycle for textbook adoptions in foreign language, visual and performing arts, and health. On Tuesday, October 11, 2016 the Paso Robles Joint Unified School District's Board of Trustees held a public hearing to certify the extent to which textbooks and instructional materials have been provided to students. The Board of Trustees adopted Resolution No. 17-07 which certifies as required by Education Code §60119 (1) that textbooks and instructional materials were provided to all students, including English learners, in the district to the extent that each pupil has a textbook or instructional materials, or both, to use in class and to take home, (2) sufficient textbooks and instructional materials were provided to each student, including English learners, that are aligned to the academic content standards and consistent with the cycles and content of the curriculum frameworks in math, science, history-social science, and English/language arts, (3) sufficient textbooks or instructional materials were provided to each pupil enrolled in foreign language or health classes, and (4) sufficient laboratory science equipment was available for science laboratory classes offered in grades 9-12 inclusive. In addition to core subject areas, districts are required to disclose in their SARCs the sufficiency of instructional materials used for their visual/performing arts curricula. During the 2018-19 school year, Paso Robles Joint Unified School District provided each student, including English learners, enrolled in a visual/performing arts class with instructional materials to use in class and to take home. These materials complied with the state's content standards and curriculum frameworks.

School Facility Conditions and Planned Improvements (Most Recent Year)

The district takes great efforts to ensure that all schools are clean, safe, and functional through proper facilities maintenance and campus supervision. Independence High School's original facilities were built in 2010; ongoing maintenance and campus improvements ensure facilities remain up to date and provide adequate space for students and staff. District maintenance and site custodial staff ensure that the repairs necessary to keep the school in good condition are completed in a timely manner. A work order process is used by school and district staff to communicate non-routine maintenance requests. Emergency repairs are given the highest priority. In the last 12 months, the following improvements have been completed:

- Installation of gender neutral restroom signs.
- Replacement of water heater.
- Fire alarm electrical repair.

Every morning before school begins, the custodian inspects facilities for safety hazards or other conditions that need attention prior to students and staff entering school grounds. One day custodian and one part-time evening custodian are assigned to Independence High School. The day custodian is responsible for:

- Classroom cleaning
- Office area cleaning
- Restroom cleaning
- General use area cleaning

Restrooms are checked throughout the day for cleanliness and subsequently cleaned as needed. The evening custodian is responsible for:

- Restroom cleaning

The principal communicates with custodial staff daily concerning maintenance and school safety issues.

School Safety Plan (School Year 2020-2021)

Paso Robles Independent Study Center (PRISC) is a homeschool program sharing a common campus with other alternative education programs (Liberty Continuation High School and Independence High School). The three programs have a joint Safe School Plan to meet the needs of students and staff while on site; homeschool families come to the main campus (or see teachers on satellite campuses) on a weekly or bi-weekly basis. The main homeschool site follows the School Safety Plan for Liberty and Independence High Schools; the students and staff on satellite sites follow the School Safety Plans of the comprehensive elementary and middle schools that house them.

The Comprehensive School Site Safety Plan was developed for PRISC in collaboration with local agencies and the district office to fulfill Senate Bill 187 requirements. Components of this plan include child abuse reporting procedures, teacher notification of dangerous pupil procedures, disaster response procedures, procedures for safe arrival and departure from school, sexual harassment policy, and dress code policy. The school's most recent school safety plan was reviewed, updated, and discussed with school staff by December 2019. Areas of focus include PBIS recognition, improving parent involvement, security cameras and parking lot safety.

All training and curriculum development activities at Independence High School revolve around the California Common Core State Standards. During the 2019-20 school year, Independence High School held staff development training devoted to:

- Anti-Bullying
- Crisis Prevention Institute (CPI)
- Depth of Knowledge (DOK)
- Google Apps for Education
- Project Based Learning
- Positive Behavior Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

- Universal Design for Learning

Decisions concerning selection of staff development activities are performed by all staff using tools such as teacher input, state assessment results, and data analysis to determine the areas in which additional teacher training may enhance classroom instruction and increase student achievement levels. Independence High School supports ongoing professional growth throughout the year during weekly PLC days. Teachers meet in both grade level and department level teams to conduct data analysis to identify areas of need. Teaching staff are provided the opportunity to participate in district-sponsored staff development workshops or training session as 1) a supplement to site-based staff development, 2) for reinforcement of or follow-up on previous training, or 3) follow-up training for newly implemented programs/curricula. During the 2015-16 school year, Independence High School's teachers attended the following events hosted by the Paso Robles Joint Unified School District:

- California Mathematics and Science Partnership (CaMSP) (for STEM teachers)
- Direct Interactive Instruction (for new teachers)
- English Language Development (ELD)
- Gifted and Talented Education (GATE) K-12 Articulation (for GATE, Honors and AP teachers)

- Gradebook Training (for new teachers)
- Professional Learning Communities (PLC's)
- Universal Design for Learning (UDL) – Co Teaching

Independence High School offers support to new and veteran teachers through peer coaching and mentoring. Instructional aides are provided targeted training focused on teaching strategies and curriculum content. Substitute teachers are invited to participate in designated staff development activities. All staff are encouraged to attend professional workshops and conferences. Classified support staff receive job-related training from department supervisors and district representatives.
