COVID-19 Vaccination

- California will allocate 40% of vaccine doses to high-risk areas based on equity metrics
- Week of March 1st, EUSD Staff were surveyed and provided an opportunity to receive a single-use code for vaccination
- March 4th and 5th were designated as Oakland Coliseum Education Worker Vaccination Days (6,000 doses per day)
- ACOE will start to offer codes on a rolling basis to increase accessibility
- Many thanks to HR Director, Marian Harrell, ACOE, ACPHD and FEMA/CAL-OES

Senate Bill 86 COVID-19 Relief & Return to Campus

Governor Newsom and legislatures reached an agreement on March 1, 2021

- \$2 billion dollars allocated for in-person instruction grants
- School districts that offer in-person instruction by April 1st are eligible for the grant
- School districts unable to meet these requirements for in-person instruction by April 1 remain eligible for a reduced grant amount as long as in-person instruction is offered by May 15th
- The grant is reduced by 1% for each day of instruction between April 1st and May 15th that the school district does not provide in-person instruction in accordance with grant requirements

Senate Bill 86 COVID-19 Relief & Return to

Campus

The table below identifies the requirements to offer in-person instruction as a condition of receiving the grant, based on the color tiers in the Blueprint for a Safer Economy.

*Specialized cohorts serving foster youth, students without permanent housing, students at risk of neglect or abuse, English learners, disengaged students, students with disabilities, and students without access to technology to participate in distance learning.

Senate Bill 86 COVID-19 Relief & Return to Campus cont.

\$6.5 billion apportionment for Expanded Learning

This funding may be used for a number of purposes, which include:

- Extending instructional learning time (extended school year or summer school);
- Accelerating progress to close learning gaps through tutoring or other programs;
- Providing integrated pupil supports, such as mental health services;
- Implementing community learning hubs that provide pupils with access to technology, high-speed internet, and other academic supports; and
- Training school staff on strategies, including trauma-informed practices.

Targeted: Students who are eligible for free or reduced-price meals, English learners, foster youth, homeless, exceptional needs, at risk/disengaged students, and students who are below grade level, among other prioritized groups

School districts must adopt a Expanded Learning Plan by June 1, 2021

- Data from the Town Hall meeting on 3/9/2021.


Methods of Data Collection

- The school office staff from all three sites contacted parents who didn't respond to surveys and collected information from them on the phone.



- I'm in favor of re-opening the schools for special needs students only.
- I would be interested to know health/safety implementation protocols procedures ie.
 individual hygiene protocol, facilities configuration/ airflow compliance etc.
- I wouldn't be able to make any decisions until I've received my schedule from my job for when we return to work and I would need to coordinate childcare.


Additional Responses

- I suggest all teachers be required to get vaccinations and provide COVID testing for students if you all will reopen for this current school year.

If our schools transition to a Hybrid model this school year, will there be any hardships for you? If so, please describe.

- I do have high blood pressure but I'm assuming I'll be vaccinated before returning.
- Yes, with childcare. The childcare/school for my children starts at the same time school will start and ends an hour earlier than school ends. There is no option for an extended day and the drop off and pick up windows are very short (and strict). I will not be able to bring my children to school nor am able to find alternative childcare for the remainder of the academic year. With that said, I am not sure how I will be able to work a the full hours for the remainder of the year.
- I'm not a fan of the hybrid models, because of the scheduling issues they create for families, and because they seem unfair to families who do not have caregivers able to shuttle kids around. My own kids will back in school and they will be in different hybrid models and I have no idea how we will all get to where we need to be at these random times. I would much prefer going back normal schedule. But I'm assuming that's not an option.
- I am concerned about equity if not even a half class can fit in a classroom with social distancing. I am also concerned out teachers and faculty being able get vaccinated and having enough PPE for students.
- I have too many students who are extremely vulnerable to contagion and also limited in their access to understanding the complexity of the present day scenario of Covid-19.
- Child care might be a big issue when it comes to my ability to return.
- I do have appointments for the vaccine.
- Before we get the shot, it is not wise to have Hybrid model.

Certificated Staff

- Yes. My own children will also likely be in a hybrid model with different schedules and transportation needs. They will need to be with me during virtual school so that is another hardship.
- I live with someone who is at high risk for Covid-19 related complications.
- Space to maintain social distance
- I have requested accommodations.
- Yes. There are several people in my immediate bubble who are in at-risk groups.
- I care for a person who is high risk of contacting COVID 19 and I don't feel comfortable returning to the school with a second strand of COVID 19 out.
- Yes. I am in numerous high-risk categories. I have a secondary school age child and secondary schools will not be open as soon as elementary
- Childcare, I have two children at home whose preschool closed down for the entire year and are home with us all the time, so my wife and I have share duties and figure out a schedule around our work.

Classified Staff

• Yes, child care since I have a little girl at home due to her closure.

- Daycare
- Yes my child attends Anna Yates. I have him down for Hybrid on campus as well but it would only accommodate him for 2 Days. He is in the learning hub now which services him 4 days a week. I would have to find a sitter or program for him to attend for the other 2 days he can not come on campus.

Planning Consideration

- Every community is unique continue to be responsive and intentional with reopening plans with stakeholders in mind
- Students' social-emotional well-being and academic learning remain as our top priority
- Limited Staffing childcare, medical, other hardships and need for subs
- Instructional Model
 - Change in classroom teacher(s), Virtual Academy
 - Possible impact to learning hub and instructional time
- Negotiations agreement still pending with Labor Partner
- Close to the end of the year
 - Explore options for in-person activities

Next Steps

- Continue Progress on the Reopening Schools Readiness
 Dashboard and Site Preparation
- Revisit Family Intent Forms and Master Schedule
- Consider alternatives that can increase student interactions with less interruption to the instructional program if possible
- Continue negotiations to reach a MOU agreement
- Plan for in-person summer school and 2021-22 Learning Recovery (Acceleration)
- Board may consider to take action on the instructional plan
