Overview of New Funding Sources

- Expanded Learning Opportunities Program (ELO-P)
 - New funding - requires districts to offer 9 hour day for unduplicated students
 - Requirements similar to ASES and 21st CCLC
 - GUSD will receive approximately \$2 million of on-going funding
- Elementary and Secondary Schools Emergency Relief III (ESSER III)
 - Larger comprehensive plan includes:
 - Expansion of Power School at Glen View to serve Kinder and 1st grade
 - Additional staff positions to support with student behavioral needs
 - Power School staff to support with intervention model during school day

Areas of Need

In order for Power School to meet the funding requirements and needs of students the following areas of need have been identified:

- Lack of access to Power School at Brownell or Solorsano Middle Schools
- Glen View is only ASES funded and doesn't accept Kinder or 1st grade students
- Behavioral concerns continue to be barrier for participation for some students
- Unique family needs are unclear
- Additional intervention support during school day

Plan to Meet Needs

Gilroy Unified School District has identified the following solutions to identified needs:

- Create new Power School programs at Brownell and Solorsano Middle Schools
- Expansion of Power School at Glen View to serve Kinder or 1st grade students
- Additional staff positions to support with student behavioral needs
- Listening Sessions with families of unduplicated students
- Power School staff to support with intervention model during the school day
