Mrs. Lopez took a point of privilege to recognize the students, especially the students of Cesar Chavez Middle School. They have worked hard, especially with the food distributions. Mrs. Lopez welcomed them to participate in future Board meetings. She is grateful for all they have done for the Lynwood community. 10.B. Superintendent's Report *(Full presentation available on the District website.)*

Superintendent Crosthwaite greeted everyone and invited Mr. Fromm, Chief Business Official, forward to lead the staff recognition.

10.B.1. Recognition:

Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation (MOT)

Mr. Fromm shared that the MOT department has worked very hard during the pandemic. MOT staff did not have the option to work from home and had to report to their worksites since the District school closures in March 2020. MOT staff continued to work hard since the schools reopened, keeping the classrooms clean, repairing HVAC systems, amongst other duties. He invited Mr. Gustavo Gonzalez, Director of MOT, forward to acknowledge MOT staff.

Mr. Gonzalez thanked the Board and administration for this recognition. He acknowledged 140 employees that work under Maintenance, Operations and Transportation and thanked them for their hard work, dedication and commitment to the Lynwood community.

Mr. Fromm presented a certificate of recognition to Mr. Gonzalez for his hard work and dedication.

Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS)

Superintendent Crosthwaite announced that sixteen Lynwood USD school sites have been recognized for the successful implementation of the Positive Behavioral Interventions and Supports (PBIS) program.

Dr. Shawna Dinkins, Assistant Superintendent of Educational Services, is proud of the great accomplishments in Lynwood. She provided an overview of the PBIS program, highlighting that this program is focused on the success of our students. The District has more than doubled the number of schools that have earned this recognition. This year, the District has also earned the highest honor in the entire state for Wilson Elementary School. This special recognition is a testament of how our District and administrators endured and thrived during the pandemic.

Dr. Dinkins acknowledged the administration for their leadership. She gave a special recognition to Wilson Elementary School's administration, Ms. Trionne Magee, Principal, and Dr. Yadira Perez, former Assistant Principal, for earning the Platinum Award. Each site received a plaque of recognition.

Dr. Dinkins acknowledged Dr. Maribel Martinez, Director of Student Services, for her leadership and support of the PBIS program.

10.B.2. Presentation:

Local Control and Accountability Plan (LCAP)

Dr. Dinkins acknowledged the Los Angeles County Office of Education (LACOE), Fiscal Services, and Equity, Access, and Instruction (EAI) team for their great work. She thanked them for modeling true collective collaboration. The departments worked collaboratively to ensure the LCAP revisions were at an excellent level. Dr. Dinkins shared a message from Jeanne Keith, LACOE consultant, who acknowledged the Lynwood USD administration for their outstanding work in completing the revisions as recommended by the LACOE team for the 2021-24 LCAP. Ms. Keith commended the District for being a model for the County and State.

Dr. Patricia Brent-Sanco, Director of Equity, Access, and Instructional Services, provided an overview of the LACOE recommendations for Lynwood USD. She highlighted the revisions made to specific LCAP Goals and Actions.

Dr. Castro congratulated the team for addressing the concerns and for incorporating stakeholder input. She is happy to see the investment in the different programs and opportunities, as well as professional development for staff.

Mrs. Lopez thanked the administration for all of their work with the LCAP revisions.

Dr. Brent-Sanco thanked Mr. Peter Wong, Interim Director of Fiscal Services, as well as Ms. Brenda Romero, Assistant Director of Fiscal Services, for collaborating with the team to finalize the LCAP.

Superintendent Crosthwaite acknowledged the team's work, highlighting that Dr. Dinkins and Dr. Brent-Sanco are being sought to present statewide in terms of the work being done in our District. This is a testament of the talent, commitment, and passion that we have in the District.

Facilities Update

Superintendent Crosthwaite provided an overview of Resolution No. 20-21/24, approved by the Board of Education on February 11, 2021. He provided important updates regarding the progress at Lynwood High School under the End of Year Highlights presentation.

End of Year Highlights and Report (Full presentation available on the District website.)

Superintendent Crosthwaite acknowledged the Lynwood community for their partnership with the District in supporting the District's efforts in assisting students, staff and community. The partnership was established with Resolution No. 19-20/35, Lynwood United, approved by the Board on March 22, 2020.

Superintendent Crosthwaite acknowledged all Lynwood USD staff for their hard work and dedication. The District has made an effort to recognize all employees, as this has been a very demanding time for all. The District was faced with various challenges, including obtaining COVID tests and technology. He thanked all employees and the Lynwood community for being patient and for partnering with the District to make a positive difference.

Superintendent Crosthwaite thanked the Board for always putting the Lynwood students front and center. He acknowledged them for never wavering from doing what is right and for challenging the Cabinet members to continue growing and improving. He thanked them for their leadership and commitment.

Superintendent Crosthwaite provided an overview of all of the great things the District has accomplished. Highlights of his presentation included:

Mr. Morales acknowledged staff for the work completed at Lynwood High School Bullis to ensure the campus was ready by the first day of school. He is proud of this accomplishment and is grateful for everyone's contribution in bringing life to the campus.

Mr. Hardie acknowledged staff for all of their hard work and for displaying resilience during a difficult time. He appreciates the level of detail on behalf of staff to go above and beyond what was required to do the best for our Lynwood community. He expressed his gratitude for staff's perseverance when faced with different challenges, including not having access to COVID tests and vaccines. Mr. Hardie is proud to see all of the work that has been accomplished, including the work at Lynwood High School Bullis. He thanked all District staff for their hard work and dedication.

Mrs. Lopez thanked everyone involved in the Lynwood High School Bullis project for their contribution in ensuring the campus was ready by the first day of school. She shared the nervousness and doubt she experienced wondering if the team would meet the deadline. She thanked the administration, especially Mr. Fromm and Superintendent Crosthwaite, for their leadership and making sure that the project was completed on time.

Mr. Morales shared his concerns regarding the project at Lynwood High School Bullis. He recalled seeing the campus in June and questioning whether or not the project would be completed on time. He is grateful for everyone's contribution in making sure the campus was ready by the first day of school.

Dr. Castro echoed her colleagues in expressing her appreciation for all District staff. She acknowledged everyone's sacrifice to prepare for the new school year. She is grateful for all of their work. She thanked the Lynwood community for entrusting the District to provide the highest quality of education for their children.

Superintendent Crosthwaite thanked the Board for their feedback and support. He shared additional highlights regarding District accomplishments, including the following:

Superintendent Crosthwaite is very proud of the work the District was able to accomplish given some very difficult and challenging circumstances. He thanked District staff for all that they do for our students. He also thanked the Board for their leadership and always advocating to support our students.

10.C. Board Members' Reports

Mr. Del Real-Calleros congratulated the recipients of the successful PBIS implementation award. He is glad to see the District recognizing these school sites for their achievement. He expressed his appreciation for this program as it allows schools to practice restorative justice as opposed to zero tolerance.

Mr. Del Real-Calleros shared that he had an opportunity to visit a few school sites. He was pleased to see that many students are complying with the COVID-19 safety protocols, including wearing face masks. He was able to witness the staff conducting health screenings and students sanitizing their hands before they entered classrooms. Mr. Del Real-Calleros had an opportunity to visit his alma mater, Vista High School, where he had

an opportunity to answer questions and share about his journey in higher education.

Mr. Del Real-Calleros also visited Firebaugh High School during lunch time, where he was able to interact with students. He shared that some students enjoy the food that is served and is aware that others do not enjoy the food or only eat it because they are hungry. He acknowledged that student feedback is important and is pleased to participate in the Parent Menu Committee with the Director of Child Nutrition, Ms. Vanessa Jones, to collaborate with stakeholders to address concerns.

Mr. Del Real-Calleros encouraged the community to donate business attire to Vista High School. The school offers a very important program, known as “Adult Transition,” that allows students to borrow business clothes for the day and return it when they are done. Staff at Vista HS monitors the use of clothing and washes them to ensure clothes are always ready for the students.

Mr. Del Real-Calleros enjoyed his visits to the school sites. He shared a few concerns with Superintendent Crosthwaite to make sure staff takes action to correct. He announced that districts are currently experiencing a shortage in substitute teachers and encouraged the community to seek an opportunity to become a substitute teacher for our District if they have certain requirements in place. He also announced that he was invited to accompany Mr. Custodio Gomez to the Teacher of the Year reception hosted by the Los Angeles County Office of Education.

Mr. Hardie commended Lynwood High School staff for their work and preparation for this year’s Homecoming game. He also commended them for the steps they took, with the assistance of campus safety and District administrators, in ensuring student safety during an unfortunate incident that occurred outside of the campus during the game.

Mr. Hardie requested that District administration consider establishing a crisis response team in partnership with the City of Lynwood and community members to address different incidents that occur in the city. The team would respond to calls in the city such as loss of life and loss of shelter, and provide support services as needed. He suggested that the team have a similar structure as the food pantry team, to respond and support the needs in the community.

Mr. Hardie acknowledged the Maintenance, Operations, and Transportation (MOT) team for their hard work during the pandemic.

Dr. Castro shared that she had an opportunity to meet with the PBK/WLC architectural firm regarding the design of the building at Lynwood High School Imperial. She was able to share her perspective on the design and the importance of engaging stakeholders in conversation.

Dr. Castro provided information regarding State Superintendent Tony Thurmond’s statewide literacy campaign. She looks forward to learning more about the vision for every child to be reading by third grade, and how that aligns with our LCAP goals.

Dr. Castro has been invited to participate in the Parent Menu Committee. She looks forward to joining the parents to learn more about the nutrition offered in the District. She invited the Lynwood community to continue celebrating Latino Heritage Month through October 15. She congratulated the recipients of the PBIS award. She is pleased to see all of the end of year highlights presented and how the District is making great progress.

Mrs. Lopez acknowledged the presence of Martina Rodriguez, former Board member. She welcomed Mrs. Rodriguez to continue providing valuable feedback.

Mrs. Lopez thanked Dr. Patrick Gittisriboongul, Assistant Superintendent of Technology and Innovation, for the great work he is doing. She is excited to see his efforts in motion and the great impact it will have on the Lynwood community.

Mrs. Lopez thanked the entire administration team for the great work we are doing in the District.

12. PUBLIC COMMENT/COMMUNICATIONS

The following public comment was submitted electronically and was read into the record by Dr. Brian Lucas, Assistant Superintendent of Human Resources.

Martha Arroyo

This pandemic has brought focus to how broken and unfair the education system is! Districts treat our schools and students as a business with a focus on numbers rather than our students and their needs. The district matrices, pacing guides, and assessments create a lot of stress on teachers and students.

Last year, the district had a choice to opt out of SBAC testing but decided to have teachers administer it remotely. We had to waste valuable instructional minutes to train students on how to use the testing platform. Then, we had to waste more time administering this assessment that we knew our kids were stressed out about and were not ready for. That time could have been spent on instruction that the students so greatly needed. There is no empathy or forethought from the district—not even during a pandemic. If the district really cared about our students and really saw them as young humans, they would reconsider the number of benchmark and district-mandated assessments given this year. They would modify the pacing guides. They would allow teachers to make decisions in regards to the pacing of instruction in their classroom based on student needs rather than dates. We need to spend time on social-emotional learning and easing students back into in-person school, but the district didn't account for that in the pacing guides!!

There's a lot of talk about mental health and self-care, but all this testing and the lack of empathy from the district are contradictory.

The following public comment was presented before the Board of Education.

Martina Rodriguez, former Board member, requested that staff provide a hard copy of the complete agenda free of charge. She reminded Mrs. Lopez of their experience as Board members in the late 90s, where the Board took action on items related to the construction of Lynwood High School. She stated that the Board action then has had a negative impact on the District now. She expressed her concerns about the amount of money being spent on the Lynwood High School Imperial project as well as Measure K and Measure N projects. Ms. Rodriguez informed the Board that she has been conducting research and she plans to attend upcoming meetings to present her findings. She does not want history to repeat itself with the current Board. She urged the Board to look into the matter to avoid suffering in the future, especially with the relocation of students.

Mrs. Lopez thanked Ms. Rodriguez for presenting her concerns. She informed Ms. Rodriguez that the Board made the decision to relocate the students as it was the best course of action to take to ensure the students had a safe place to receive their education. Mrs. Lopez acknowledged that this situation has been very difficult for everyone. The Board has been focused on hiring the best architectural firm to begin the planning process, and assured her that the community will have an opportunity to participate in the construction process.

Superintendent Crosthwaite announced that the administration is currently researching different options in terms of the vaccine. Other districts that have established a student vaccine mandate include Los Angeles, Culver City, and Oakland.

Superintendent Crosthwaite shared that the FDA has indicated approval for emergency authorization for children ages 5-11, which may be available within weeks. Pfizer has requested emergency authorization for that same age group. Pfizer is currently available for ages 12 and up under emergency authorization, with ages 16 and up fully authorized. Staff will continue doing research and will present the Board with some considerations. The administration will keep the Board updated in regards to the vaccine being required at the County level.

Mrs. Lopez requested that the administration address the concerns regarding water distribution at the high schools. She hopes that the District can have a solution to allow the students to have access to water without having to wait in a long line.

Mr. Morales suggested that the site set up a cart in the lunch area for the purpose of selling water bottles for those interested.

Superintendent Crosthwaite confirmed that staff is looking into this matter and have received feedback from students.

Mr. Del Real-Calleros moved to adjourn the meeting; Seconded by Dr. Castro. The meeting adjourned at 7:52 p.m.
