In Support of Senate Bill 830

RESOLUTION NO. 21-22/36

WHEREAS, the existing law establishes a public school financing system that requires state funding for school districts to be calculated pursuant to a local control funding formula, as specified, that includes average daily attendance as a component of that calculation for these local educational agencies; and

WHEREAS, the existing funding formula, LCFF was enacted in 2013-14, and it replaced the previous formula which had been in existence for roughly 40 years. Under the LCFF funding system, revenue limits and most state categorical programs were eliminated. The LCFF created funding targets based on student characteristics and provides greater flexibility to use these funds to improve student outcomes. The LCFF funding targets consist of grade span-specific base grants plus supplemental and concentration grants that are calculated based on student demographic factors and the Average Daily Attendance for the year.

WHEREAS, SB 830 would define “average daily membership” as the quotient of the aggregate enrollment days for all pupils in a school district, from transitional kindergarten to grade 12, inclusive, as applicable, divided by the total number of instructional days for the local educational agency in an academic year: and

WHEREAS, SB 830, commencing with the 2023-24 fiscal year, would authorize a school district to apply each fiscal year to the Superintendent for supplemental education funding: and

WHEREAS, SB 830 would require an LEA to receive as supplemental education funding the difference between what the local LEA would have received under LCFF based on average daily membership and what the LEA received under the LCFF based on average daily attendance for that fiscal year, as provided; and

WHEREAS, in order for an LEA to be eligible for supplemental educational funding, SB 830 would require the LEA to report to the Superintendent on July 1 the average daily membership for the prior academic year and to demonstrate maintenance of effort to address chronic absenteeism and habitual truancy, as provide; and

WHEREAS, SB 830 would require LEA’s to use at least 50% of their supplemental education funding to supplement existing LEA expenditures to address chronic absenteeism and habitual truancy, as provided; and

WHEREAS, SB 830 would condition implementation of these provisions upon the appropriation of funds for these purposes in the annual Budget Act or other statutes.

NOW THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Board of Education of the Lynwood Unified School District supports Senate Bill 830.
