

# UC and CSU qualified by year


The course requirements (A-G) for both UC and CSU eligibility are the same. However, UCs require a slightly higher GPA than CSUs, so the number of students who qualify for UCs each year is slightly lower than for CSUs. All students who qualify for UCs are also qualified for CSUs, but not the other way around.

The number of student graduates qualifying for both UCs and CSUs has declined each year for the past two years.




# Percent of UC and CSU qualified by ethnicity

The overall statistics on UC and CSU qualifications show the variation between ethnic groups. Of our major ethnic groups, Hispanic, Black, and Pacific Islander students show UC/CSU eligibility rates at 25% or lower as compared to other groups.




# Percent of UC and CSU qualified by EL/LI

EL students show a 6% UC/CSU eligibility rate. This score is 32% below other significant sub-groups. Low-income students score below the three-year school-wide average with rates for UC eligibility at 33% and CSU eligibility at 39% respectively




# UC-qualified students over time by EL/LI
