Banyan Humanities Academy

The Banyan Humanities Academy was created four years ago to promote academic engagement, deeper learning and an effective transition to high school. Banyan offers students the opportunity to experience a more relevant, interdisciplinary and project based approach as opposed to a more traditional program of coursework. The program's strengths include community building, interdisciplinary curricular connections, and project-based learning. The transition to high school is supported by specific program elements such as: the advisory class; collaboration approaches to teaching and learning, and community building activities and trips. Students are in mixed 9th and 10th grade English and Social Studies classes for two years, and are looped, thereby creating additional opportunities to be known and for relationship to develop. The curriculum is aligned to the Common Core English Language Arts standards, as well as the English, social studies, and health content standards. Students complete a significant project and/or exhibition at least once per semester, and document their learning via a portfolio. Banyan works with educational organizations like For Words and Envision Learning Partners to create authentic, rigorous, and inquiry-based demonstrations of student learning. The English and social studies curriculum meets A-G requirements for college acceptance and also offers students an honors option for increased academic challenge.
