





School Safety Plan (School Year 2019—20)

Montemalaga Elementary is a very safe and clean school. The school's classrooms, restrooms, and other site buildings are kept clean by the lead and night custodians. Work orders and regular maintenance help keep

the school working smoothly. Painting takes place annually to improve the playground, classroom, and other buildings. The PTA supports a variety of beautification projects such as gardens, Kindness Rock area, paving muddy areas, and benches for outside learning areas.

In the event of an emergency, the school is very prepared. The Earthquake Emergency teams are updated annually and everyone receives information on jobs and any necessary training. The teachers and support providers are trained in CPR and First Aid every two years at the startof the new school year. Monthly Fire drills are conducted. All students are able to safely exit the school within a few minutes of the announcement of an emergency. We practice Active Shooter drills, Shelter in Place, School Evacuation. Duck and Cover, and Fire Drills throughout the school year. All classrooms have the necessary supplies in the classroom for an emergency. Additional supplies are in the Office Black Box and the Earthquake shed on the playground.

Our PTA has recently installed window shades for additional protection. All rooms have lock blocks on the door for safety.

All students and staff feel safe and demonstrate a clear understanding of what to do in the event of an emergency at school.

The district works closely with the local Police Department and PTA Safety Committee when practicing drills. The School Safety Plan is updated annually.




