Superintendent Dr. Kitamura, Assistant Superintendent Dr. Guzman, Assistant Superintendent Steve Mizera presented the Return to School Plan Draft to the Board.

During this report, a motion was made to extend the meeting until the agenda is finished.

Discussion from the Board Members included the following: Director Medina made the point that we need to move forward with the resources we have rather than shift our focus, emphasizing the purpose of the school district is to educate students rather than provide childcare. Director Sheffield reiterated the RTS plan will not offer 100% safety but rather give families options to consider during this emergency. Director De La Cruz stated that the RTS plan is the District's best attempt to make every adjustment they can to be as safe as humanly possible for students to return to school. As a community, SRCS needs to prioritize taking the necessary measures to stay safe so students can return to school. Director Klose stated that going back to school is very dangerous for students despite following all the best practices for cleanliness and other safety precautions. Director Klose asks that parents choose the option of returning to school that is best for their family, which will ultimately reduce the number of students on campus. Director Manieri expressed the need for more communication with parents, especially parents who do not speak English, also the need for trusted messengers in the District. Director Manieri believes there is a unique opportunity to make changes for the students while designing for equity. President Fong made the plea to organizations in the community to help with childcare, so it does not fall solely on the school districts.

Ethnic Studies in Santa Rosa City Schools

WHEREAS, Santa Rosa City Schools has a commitment to diversity, inclusion and equity; and

WHEREAS, Santa Rosa City Schools launched an Equity Initiative in the spring of 2015; and

WHEREAS, since 2015 1200 Santa Rosa City Schools staff have participated in Professional Development through: the Museum of Tolerance Tools for Tolerance for Educators; the California Teachers Association Unconscious Bias training; the Teaching Tolerance Standards for Social Justice training; the National Equity Project; Acosta Educational Partnership; and other well-respected consultants in the area of equity and social justice; and

WHEREAS, the Santa Rosa City Schools Board of Trustees' mission ensures equitable access to a transformative educational experience grounded in the assets of our students, staff, and community and commits to nurture the whole student in an engaging, challenging, and safe environment; and

WHEREAS, the Santa Rosa City Schools Board of Trustees' vision ensures that students enter the world empowered to find purpose, think critically, embrace diversity, work together, and adapt to our changing planet, and live healthy and fulfilling lives; and

WHEREAS, the Board of Trustees acknowledges the academic research that associates the overwhelming dominance of Euro-American perspectives in textbooks, curricula and instruction and marginalization of scholarship and accomplishments by people of color as contributors to disengagement from academic learning of many students of color; and

WHEREAS, in the 2019-20 school year, the California Department of Education DataQuest program shows that in Santa Rosa City Schools 73% of elementary students are non-white, including 32% English Learners; and 66% of secondary students are non-white, including 12% English Learners; and

WHEREAS, substantial research done by the National Education Association and Stanford University found that high school students who participated in an ethnic studies course showed positive academic and personal outcomes for students, including: closing the opportunity gap, reducing student truancy, increasing student retention, reducing dropout rates, increasing graduation rates, and developing a sense of self-efficacy and personal empowerment; and

WHEREAS, Ethnic studies pedagogy humanizes all people by honoring the cultural wealth of historically underserved groups, by critically analyzing systems of oppression, and by promoting action in solidarity with others to transform students' lives and communities; and

WHEREAS, Santa Rosa City Schools recognized the importance of and is committed towards implementing an Ethnic Studies curriculum in our schools; and

WHEREAS, current board policy states that we will adopt curriculum and instructional materials that accurately reflect the diversity among student groups; and

WHEREAS, current board policy analyzes expenditures and allocates financial and human resources in a manner that provides all students with equitable access to district programs, support services, and opportunities for success and promotes equity and inclusion in the district. Such resources include access to high-quality administrators, teachers, and other school personnel; funding; technology, equipment, textbooks, and other instructional materials; facilities; and community resources or partnerships. and

WHEREAS, AB 331 is a current bill, active in the California State Legislature, which will add a course of Ethnic Studies to be a high school graduation requirement in California public and charter schools; and

WHEREAS, CA AB 2016 Ethnic Studies Model Curriculum (ESMC) is currently in process at the California Department of Education (CDE); and the ESMC draft has vast support from communities of color and intergenerational recognized Ethnic Studies educators and leaders across California and beyond, and

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that governing board of education affirms support of the California Ethnic Studies Model Curriculum Draft and for the continuation of Pacific Islander Studies and Arab American Studies course outlines and the representation of West Asian American Studies, all under Asian American Studies, as well as Central American Studies under Chicana/o and Latinx Studies in the ESMC.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that the Santa Rosa City Schools District supports the addition of Ethnic Studies to the TK-12 District; and

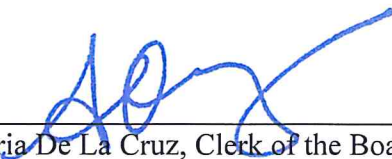
BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the governing board of education supports AB 331, and shall submit a letter of support to our local State Senator, Mike McGuire, the bill sponsor Assembly member Jose Medina, and any other legislators deemed appropriate by the Superintendent.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, Santa Rosa City Schools will add UC/CSU approved Ethnic Studies courses to its high school catalogue and will support the infusion of Ethnic Studies in elementary and middle schools.

BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, the governing board of education directs the superintendent to provide TK-12 professional development to ensure quality culturally responsive pedagogy, curriculum and instructional materials.

AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED, that Santa Rosa City Schools affirms and supports the California Ethnic Studies Draft Model Curriculum.

Endorsement of Proposition 15**The California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act of 2020 (also known as
The California Tax On Commercial Industrial Properties
For Education and Local Government Funding Initiative 2020)**

WHEREAS, since the passage of Proposition 13 in 1978, school funding in California has experienced severe limitations in what was once the main source of funding for schools, the property tax;

WHEREAS, while the intent of Proposition 13 is to help homeowners, a loophole in the system permits major commercial and industrial properties to avoid regular reassessment, providing a windfall to commercial property owners at the expense of vital school funding;

WHEREAS, the share of the property tax burden has shifted away from commercial property and toward residential property throughout the state and in virtually every county;

WHEREAS, per-pupil support, which relies on state funding, has declined from the top 10 in the nation to the bottom quarter;

WHEREAS, school funding in California is \$2,400 per pupil less than the national average and \$10,000 below the top-funded states, while California's cost of living is among the highest in the nation;

WHEREAS, staffing ratios for teachers, counselors, librarians, and administrators in California rank at the bottom in the nation;

WHEREAS, public schools in California face challenges in providing an equitable and fair education for a student population with vast differences in language, income, parental education level, and other social, educational, and economic factors;

WHEREAS, research has proven that investments in high needs students raises achievement levels, lowers poverty, and increases the productivity of the workforce;

WHEREAS, estimates by academic researchers at the University of Southern California (USC) have identified that reassessing commercial property will raise \$12 billion in property tax revenue every year for local schools, cities and counties;

WHEREAS, USC has identified that nearly 80 percent of the revenue will come from just 8 percent of large properties;

WHEREAS, USC research shows that a majority of commercial property owners already are assessed at close to market value, making the current system inequitable among businesses, benefitting a relatively small number of properties owned by the largest corporations and wealthy owners who have held land for a long period of time;

WHEREAS, the current failure to close the commercial property loophole has led to poor land use and inflated land values, particularly limiting the ability to provide adequate high-density housing and land use;

WHEREAS, the Schools and Local Communities Funding Act is on the November 2020 ballot;

WHEREAS, the measure provides about \$4.5 billion annually for K-14 schools;

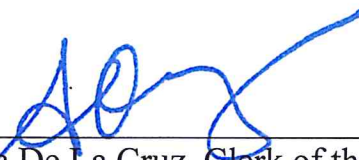
WHEREAS, the measure will provide funding to all school districts, over and above Proposition 98 funding, and following the local control funding formula to all students in need in all districts;

WHEREAS, the Schools and Local Communities Funding Act will also provide billions in funding yearly for cities, counties, and special districts in locally controlled revenues for affordable housing, parks, libraries, health and human services, libraries, and public infrastructure;

WHEREAS, the Schools and Local Communities Funding Act will improve land use, provide a direct tax break to small businesses, and level the playing field between neighboring commercial property owners; now,

THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED, that the Santa Rosa City Schools District endorses "The California Schools and Local Communities Funding Act of 2020" ballot measure in November 2020 general election.
