



Stable Groups

- Marin County Public Health has provided guidance that supports the return of full, in-person instruction based on school readiness and adherence to a submitted / review school site specific protection plan.
- Four feet distance is permissible between students within a classroom or instructional area where requirements herein are in practice.
 - For middle and high schools, larger cohorts made up of students from more than one classroom may be arranged as long as accurate attendance data for students and adults is maintained on a daily basis while avoiding school wide mixing of students and staff.
- Marin County Public Health categorizes students and/or staff as part of an “exposed cohort” when they are identified as a close contact.
 - Contact tracing identifies close contacts of a COVID-19 positive student or staff member.
 - Close contacts are defined as someone who was within six feet of a person diagnosed with COVID-19 for a cumulative total of 15 minutes or more throughout a 24-hour period starting from two days before illness onset (or, for asymptomatic patients, two days prior to test specimen collection).
 - SSSPP are implemented to ensure that the majority of secondary school students / staff do not meet the definition of close contact.
