#### School Description and Mission Statement (School Year 2018-19)

Freedom Elementary opened its doors to educating children in grades Kindergarten through fifth grade in 2002. During the 2017-2018 school year, approximately 672 students were enrolled in kindergarten through fifth grade. **Cleaning Process:** Freedom Elementary School strives to maintain a safe, healthy, nurturing and orderly school campus that encourages positive attitudes in students and staff. The district governing board has adopted cleaning standards for all schools in the district. Schools are on a regular cleaning schedule including wiping surface areas, being swept or vacuumed and the trash emptied. The cafeteria, gym, and all restrooms are cleaned daily. Grounds are groomed on a rotating basis with trash, lawn, and plumbing issues addressed as needed.

**Maintenance and Repair:** Freedom Elementary School is in good repair. The site is being maintained to the standards of the Sylvan Union School District. The parking lots and playground asphalt was seal coated and re-stripped in July 2018. Freedom Elementary School is in good repair and is prepared for daily learning activities.

### School Safety Plan (School Year 2018-19)

Freedom School has adopted a comprehensive School Safety Plan that is reviewed and updated annually by members of the School Site Council. The Site Council is comprised of teachers, classified staff, parents, and the principal. The Safety Plan for the 2017-2018 school year was formally approved by the school's School Site Council on 2/20/18. The school staff suggested final changes and had input on new assignments at the 8/9/17 staff meeting. The revised Safety Plans are presented to the Sylvan Union School District Board of Trustees for annual review and approval. The Safety Plan is reviewed with staff members at the beginning of each school year with particular attention paid to emergency situations and staff and student responses. Safety drills, including fire, earthquake, and lockdown procedures, are held regularly. In addition, the school is inspected annually by the fire marshal and daily by the custodian. All issues discovered during these inspections are given the utmost priority. Copies of the comprehensive School Safety Plan are posted in each classroom and office area.
